Strawberry Pie Coffee

Salmon Croquettes
1 tablespoon butter, 5 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, 1 cup salmon, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons cold water, 1/2 cups rolled cracker or bread crumbs.
Melt the butter and add the flour. When well mixed add the milk and cook until a very thick sauce forms. Stir constantly to prevent scorching. Add the salt, pepper, celery salt and salmon. Mix well. Cool. Beat the egg and water. Dip tablespoons of the salmon mixture into the crumbs and then into the egg mixture and again into the crumbs. Shape. Fry in deep hot fat until the croquettes are well browned.

Strawberry Pie
1/2 cup lard, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons cold water, 2 cups strawberries (washed and hulled), 2 1/2 cups sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter.
Mix the one and a half cups of flour with the salt. Cut in the lard and glazy and the cold water. Reserve one-quarter of the dough and roll out the rest to fit into a deep pie pan. Fill into place. Mix the berries, sugar and two tablespoons of flour. Pour into the pie shell. Dot with the butter. Roll out the remaining dough and cut one-quarter inch strips. Arrange these in criss-cross fashion on top of the berries. Bake for 30 minutes in a moderate oven.

When adding green pepper, celery, onions or other similar seasonings to foods, cut them very fine with scissors.

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
