THE GARDEN

FEED YOUR SHRUBS AND FLOWERS

Intelligence in the choice and use of fertilizers is paramount. Only the fertilizer used when it will satisfy the purposes. Fertilizers whose substance become quickly soluble and hence, whose strength will quickly wash away, are valuable for use only at times when their substance can be immediately taken up and for forcing purposes in growing flowers and vegetables. The best all around fertilizer is well rotted manure. Fresh manure can be used when it will have a chance to rot in the soil or where its application will not cause it to come in contact with the roots or tops of plants. Fresh manure is apt to contain an endless number of weed seeds. Compound fertilizers of various formulas can be secured from stores making a business of handling them. It is usually more convenient to purchase prepared or mixed fertilizers when a small amount is needed than to resort to home mixing.

When the desire is to supply the different elements separately, one can use separate materials which are a source of that particular element. Nitrogen is available in nitrate of soda, stable manure, sulphate of ammonia, and dried blood. Phosphorus can be added to the soil in the form of acid phosphate or bone meal. A layer of raw bone left to rot in the bottom of the planting bed will answer the same purpose. Potassium can be supplied in the form of potash sulphate, kainit, or unbleached wood ashes.
