URGES QUIZ OF COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

raised funds for this building it was stated: "Fortunately we have the location of all locations just opposite the senate wing of the capitol."

Paid Agents

"Its principal methods of activity are personal solicitation and propaganda, and finally political action into which your committee is not inquiring. It employs paid professional agents and agents, one of whom is Clarence True Wilson, its secretary to communicate with members of congress, to go before committees of congress, and to solicit departments of the government. It sends each week to members of the senate and house and to many newspapers a propaganda sheet which advocates or opposes legislation and attacks in abusive language officials who are not in accord with its views. No other organization of any kind can compare with this organization in its constant and systematic legislative activity."

"The political activity, a prominent feature of its work, not within the purview of the authority of your committee to investigate, is one property for the department of justice to inquire into respecting expenditures in violation of the federal corrupt practices act, and to this the attention of that department has been directed."

"Its interference with the judiciary includes recommendation for the appointment of federal judges and opposition to the confirmation of federal judges and other federal officials, including United States attorneys and local judges in the District of Columbia, attempted coercion by public attacks and vilification of judges in public addresses such as that delivered at Melrose, Mass., on April 12, 1929 by Clarence True Wilson."

Accuses Federal Council

"I wish also to draw to your attention an organization known as the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. This organization, working largely by propaganda, attempts to influence congress on both domestic and foreign policies."

"According to its annual reports, about one-fourth of its income is received from the churches and about three-fourths from 'other sources.'"

"The sums received from 'other sources' amounted in 1926 to \$24,524.29, in 1927 to \$23,618.25, and in 1928 to \$24,339.23. It has been said that persons interested in international banking, international business and other international interests, their agents and servants, their legal advisers and members of their family are largely contributors to this organization, and that these contributions are made in part with the purpose of influencing the political activities of this organization."

Methodist Board in Denial

After reading the letter, Tinkham said the Methodist board had denied it was a lobbying organization.

The witness read a copy of a letter, written to Clarence True Wilson, secretary of the Methodist board, by Senator Capeland, Democrat, New York, which said the senator had been "greatly concerned for years over what I regard to be an improper activity, the work at Washington of the Methodist board in its manifest effort to dictate and control legislation."

"I disapprove this," Capeland added. "It is a view of it is not the function of the Methodist church. Our traditional attitude has been one of rebellion against ecclesiastical interference with the state."

A reply from Dr. Wilson said the Methodist church had no lobby in Washington or elsewhere.

Health Talks

THE COMMON STY

Sties are common and painful afflictions affecting the eyelids. They are of two sorts, the so-called internal sty, and the external sty. The latter is the more common. Both types are due to infection with pus-producing bacteria.

But the external sty involves an eyelash and its sebaceous (oil) glands, while the internal sty involves the so-called meibomian glands.

While sties are immediately due to pus-producing bacteria, they are most common in those whose personal hygiene and whose general body resistance is not what it should be.

Defective, uncorrected vision may also contribute to the development of sties, so, too, may constipation, improper diet and the habit of fingering the face, especially about the eyes.

Sties occur at all ages, but are most common in young adults. They often appear in crops.

The history of a sty is somewhat as follows: a red swelling appears at the margin of the lid. The point is painful, tender to the touch, and may be quite swollen. After a while a yellowish point appears in the swelling, showing that pus has formed.

By the application of cold compresses to the eyelid it is sometimes possible to stop a sty in the process of formation. Where this does not prove effective, hot compresses may be applied instead to hasten the "ripening" of the sty.

When the sty breaks care should be taken to keep the infection from spreading to other points on the eyelid. This may be accomplished by the use of weak sodium bicarbonate solutions. Where, however, this simple precaution

proves to be ineffective, hot compresses may be applied instead to hasten the "ripening" of the sty.

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
