SEATTLE, Wash., Apr. 10 (AP)—The annual battle for Pacific coast rowing supremacy will be waged on Lake Washington here tomorrow between California and Washington with bitterly contested events—varsity, junior-varsity and freshman.

Perfect rowing weather—sunshine and gentle breezes—was forecast for tomorrow by the weather bureau. There will be little chance of heavy winds churning up the lake and forcing postponement of the regatta until Saturday or Monday, reported the government's weather observer.

PART OF 500 WORD HISTORY MADE PUBLIC

WASHINGTON, Apr. 10 (AP)—A part of Calvin Coolidge's 500-word history of the United States beginning in the year of Our Lord 1376, the private document the eternal right to seek happiness—self government and the divine duty to defend that right at any sacrifice—was made public Wednesday by Gutzon Borglum, sculptor and member of the South Dakota congressional delegation.

The history to be inscribed in letters the size of a man's foot on the rocks of the Black Hills in South Dakota continued: "In 1377 assembled in convention they made a charter of perpetual union of free people of sovereign states establishing a government of limited powers—under an independent president—congress and court charged to provide security for all citizens in the enjoyment of liberty—equality and justice."

DYNAMITE GUS PINS THYME IN PORTLAND GO

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 10 (AP)—Dynamite Gus Sonnenberg, generally recognized as the world's champion heavy-weight wrestler, had little difficulty in defeating Ted Thyme, Portland, former world's light heavyweight champion. In two straight falls here last night. In doing so, the champion showed he carried other tricks in his bag besides his famous flying tackle. He used headlocks, body scissors, short-arm scissors and leg splits to good advantage and did some clever blocking of Thyme's pot hold. PITTSBURGH, Apr. 10 (AP)—Pittsburgh baseball fans were stunned today by the news that Barleigh Grimes, ace of the Pirates pitching staff, had been traded to the Boston Braves.
