Baked Meat Cakes, Serving 4
1 1/2 cups chopped cooked meat, 2 tablespoons chopped onions, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg, 1-3 cup flour, 4 tablespoons fat.
Mix meat, onions, salt, pepper and egg. Shape into 4 cakes, one inch thick. Roll in flour. Brown in fat and place in small baking pan. Add 1/2 inch of water and

Make 20 minutes. Turn cakes to allow even browning.
Tomato Sauce
(For fish or meat)
2 cups tomatoes, 1 cup water, 2 slices onions, 2 bay leaves, 4 whole cloves, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter.
Boil gently in covered pan 20 minutes. tomatoes, water, onions, bay leaves, cloves, sugar and salt. Strain thoroughly. Melt butter, add flour and when mixed add strained tomato mixture. Cook 3 minutes. Any leftover sauce can be served on hot boiled rice or macaroni.

Fruit Salad Dressing
(Using sour cream)
2 egg yolks, 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1-3 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup water, 1-3 cup thick sour cream.
Beat egg yolks and add sugar, flour, salt, pepper and mustard. Mix well and add fruit juices and water. Cook in double boiler until mixture thickens. Stir frequently. Beat 2 minutes. Add sour cream, mix well and chill. Serve on any combination of fruits used for salad.

Rhubarb Patties
2 cups diced rhubarb, 2-3 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 tablespoons butter.
Mix rhubarb, sugar, flour, salt, nutmeg. Pour into 4 unbaked pastry shells fitted into deep muffin pans. Dot with butter. Arrange crisp cross strips of unbaked pastry across top. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm or cold.
