COVERED WAGONS TURNED TO WEST

First Caravan to Oregon Started From Mississippi River Apr. 10, 1830.

By Dunham Wright (As Related in a Story He Wrote for the Baker-Democrat-Herald.)

MEDICAL SPRINGS, Ore. (AP)—This is centennial year. On April 10, 1830 a band of trailblazers and pathfinders started with a train of covered wagons from the then little French city located on the banks of the mother of waters, the Mississippi, to cross 2,000 miles of trackless plains, rocky mountains and deserts to the great northwest "no man's land" known as the Oregon territory. Then it was named over by three trading and fur-gathering companies, the North-west, The Hudson Bay and the American Fur company.

These companies were unfavorable to settlement of this vast domain as it would naturally interfere with their traffic. The history of all new countries follows the Bible and its teachings as to settlement and civilization. Hence the missionaries of the early thirties, Whitman, Spalding, Jason Lee and others brought in their wake settlement, home building and civilization.

virtually making it a one man affair, allowing him the use of appointing, pardoning and veto power, all that any executive officer could have.

Sleeping in Eagle Valley I feel as others do that this is sufficient to recognize this patriotic man as the first provisional governor of all of the Oregon territory. As the government and many of the states are making all places that they feel would be of interest to the traveling public, the tourist seeking information and for the benefit of our own coming generation, Oregon should mark this grand old man's last resting place with a granite shaft from the Haines quarry of Baker county, appropriately inscribed so that the people may know that the pioneer spirit still reigns supreme, is creditably taking care of their faithful servants who so loyally performed their duties when our territory was in its infant's clothes.

Recalls Happenings
I recall many disagreeable scenes and happenings when I crossed over this old trail (Old Oregon Trail) nearly seventy years ago, yet if they were flashed on the movie screen I feel that I would enjoy seeing them.

It took us a week to cross Oregon Green river in boats made of our wagon beds. All animals had to swim that great river, seeing fathers drown in the presence of their families, hunting fords for crossing streams, letting wagons down mountain sides with ropes, I saw two wagons with four yokes of oxen hitched to each wagon go milling down the swift current of Boise river, but the most gruesome sight that I ever witnessed and would not care to see again was when we came to where there had been a great earthquake, the mountain in 1852 on the Old Oregon Trail some 60 miles southeast of Boise City.

There lay in tall regrass the wagon irons in circular form while wandering through that tall grass with many others I found many human and animal bones, including many human skulls. I was a boy then of about 20. A 30-40 year old man came over me, what a place of anguish, torture, suffering and human butchery that had once been.

These are a few of the scenes witnessed by the first old covered wagon trailblazers and pathfinders. It took six months to reach our destination. Now only as many days as months are required for the tourist to make the same trip as a job ride. Do the first old pioneers deserve credit for building the first old log cabin homes and laying the foundation of what you see of our prosperous homes today?
