Few Changes In Produce Market As Week Closes

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 12 (AP)—Today's market offered few changes. The tenacity with which eggs and butter appear to hold at present prices is regarded as surprising in view of the accumulating supplies.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: "Asparagus strengthened a bit as a result of no California arrivals during the last two days. Cornish are retarding growth of Oregon-Washington brass. North-western asparagus moved to retailers at \$1.35 per dozen bunches generally, with a few sales at \$1.25 and \$1.50.

"Good celery is scarce; most large stock showing advanced seed stems. Smaller sizes are realizing \$4 to 4 dozen sizes, on account of about the same price per crate as the generally superior quality of the smaller stock.

"The second express car-load of strawberries from California was distributed this morning, meeting with good demand at \$2.75 per crate of 20 pint boxes. Quality ranged from fair to very good.

"Idaho's shipping-point potato market, which has an important effect on the entire northwest's price-level, showed additional strength yesterday, advancing to \$2.10 per cwt. of No. 1 Russets.

"Yesterday's onion shipments of 75 cars consisted of 55 cars of Texas, 10 of Bermuda, and 10 cars from Colorado and the northwest. The middle-west and east are now contributing but few onions. First carload arrivals of new Bermudas from Texas are expected at Portland, early next week."

(Continued from Page One) creek, Elk creek, Anthony creek, all being tributaries of the Powder river, are closed from Aug. 15 to Apr. 15 of each year. Black lake and Van Patton lake closed until June 1, 1931.

Union county—Gleaser lake and Prospect lake closed until Apr. 15, 1931.

Wallowa county—Bear creek, from the city of Wallowa's intake (point of diversion) to the mouth of Little Bear creek, a distance of approximately five miles, closed. Annual lake closed from Sept. 15 to Apr. 15 of each year. Wallowa lake and tributary streams closed to taking of "yanks," land-locked salmon or red fish, with yank or jerk-hook, these fish to be taken only with hook and line. Kinney lake closed. All streams flowing into Wallowa lake from said lake to the falls in said stream, closed to July 1 of each year. Wood lake, Lee lake, Bang lake, Coopers lake and Bear lake closed until Apr. 15, 1931.
