IMBLER (Special)—Prof. Don Stewart, agricultural instructor of Imbler, will go to Corvallis on Wednesday of next week accompanied by five boys of his department to participate in the annual Smith-Hughes weekend program. This is an event which has come to be a prominent one in the calendar of the Future Farmers of America and the Smith-Hughes instructors of the state in conjunction with the Oregon State college have spared nothing in making the program one which will appeal to the boys and at the same time have decided educational value.

The boys are expected to arrive on the state college campus by 4:50 o'clock on April 23 and they will be assigned rooms there and will also have their meals served on the campus.

At this meeting candidates for the Oregon Farmer Degree will witness the exemplification of that work. This degree is open to sophomores, juniors and seniors, and must be outstanding students.

Imbler will be represented by two official delegates who will have the right to vote at the state meeting.

EARLE SANDE WILL ATTEMPT BIG COMEBACK

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md., Apr. 15 (AP)—Earle Sande, for a decade one of the greatest of American jockeys, has begun a comeback that he hopes will again put him at or near the top of the list once more.

Sande, who retired as a jockey to become an owner-trainer at the end of the 1928 season, was astride Frank Hayes' Rockside yesterday but finished out of the money.

Sande has hopes of realizing his greatest ambition—the riding of 1000 winners. Over a riding career of 11 years Sande has ridden 942 winners out of a total of 3532 mounts accepted. All told, Sande's charges earned \$2,642,225 in prize money.
