Butter Slumps One Cent Today In All Grades

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 15 (AP)—Under accumulating supplies, all grades of butter declined 1c at the Portland produce exchange today. This sent the price of extras down to 40c.

Butterfat quotations also declined, making the price delivered Portland 41c.

The Sperry Flour company has reduced all flour grades 2c a barrel to keep in tune with the declining wheat market.

Egg values were unchanged with the surplus still going into storage. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau

of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Receipts of northwestern asparagus were liberal with probably 700 crates arriving from Oregon and Washington points by motor truck. No California asparagus has arrived for 5 days and truck supplies are about cleaned up. Therefore, the market for northwestern asparagus was steady at \$1.25 a \$1.50 per dozen bunches, to retailers. Heavier receipts of local and northwestern grass are anticipated, later in the week.

"Local asparagus is also plentiful, but most of the present product is becoming coarse and starchy, selling at 35c a 50c per 20-lb. crate box. Good quality asparagus commands a considerable premium over this price however.

"Texas is now originating 80 to 90 per cent of the total onion shipments which now range from 100 to 125 cars daily. Middle-western demand for Oregon onions, which was fairly active 10 days ago, has entirely subsided.

"Yakima apples continue to arrive in Portland, mostly by motor truck with only an occasional carlot arrival.

"Cabbage is higher again, at southern shipping points. Portland markets advanced again to 5c per lb.

"Green beans from Texas, and from pineapples from Cuba were novelties recently received at Portland, in carlots."

agent, Mr. Corbett believes that such development must come as the result of hard work along sound, business-like lines. Agriculture, he regards, as the fundamental asset of the state, and expressed himself as favoring anything that can be done to improve agriculture. One suggestion he made was that efforts be directed toward higher standard, both in produce and livestock.

He said that a governor is also a business manager, working through the budget commission and many boards, and must also be a promoter. He likened a governor in this respect to a chamber of commerce president.

Earlier in his talk, touching upon the 150 appointments the governor has to make, he said that the state tax commission was one of the very important ones as it has much to do with equalization of taxation. There is no necessity of allowing the present inequality of taxes to exist, he said.

Earl C. Reynolds, former secretary, was introduced and spoke briefly. He is visiting relatives here.
