Charming Recital Given Tuesday In La Grande Hotel

The recital, which was attended by about 200 persons, ranks as one of the finest of the season, with the musicians presenting many difficult numbers very ably. The selections were followed by vigorous applause and numerous encore numbers were given.

The brilliant and entertaining program was opened by "Sonata Op. 31, No. 3" by Beethoven, in which Miss Spencer displayed remarkable talent and skill in her technique and her knowledge of the instrument. This was her heaviest number and was greatly appreciated by those present.

Miss Ward added a dramatic touch to the program with her "Gypsy Flower (G)" She appeared in this charming recital in an attractive Gypsy costume.

Mrs. Curry, who has one of the most outstanding contralto voices in La Grande, sang with amazing power and her musicianship was apparent. Applause was not stifled until she consented to give encore numbers. Her selections were "Song of the Soul" by Grell, "Who Knows" by Stokles and "The Progress" by Mettelle.

Miss Spencer's second and third numbers were equally well presented, and the last number in the second group was exceptionally good. She presented "Love Song" by Joseph Suk, "Music Box" by Lidow and "Nightingale" by Liszt and then "Chimes of Saint Patrick" by Whitthorne and "Egeira" by Krosser.

The ballroom stage was very attractively decorated with flowers and ferns, giving the room a pleasant atmosphere of springtime.

Royal Joke Is Causing Smiles Among Spaniards

SEVILLE, Spain (AP)—Spaniards differed today at the prospect of their sovereign, King Alfonso XIII, upon the Duke of Spalato, youthful nephew of the king of Italy, who rumor has it, soon will be engaged to the Infanta Beatriz, Alfonso's oldest daughter.

In the presence of the Infanta Beatriz and the other members of the royal family King Alfonso led the young man to a trick bench in the palace gardens of Alcazar, where the family and their suite are remaining during holy week.

The duke was invited to sit on the bench and did so, his weight releasing a spring which controlled a concealed fountain. He was drenched with the water from the spray while King Alfonso, the Infanta, the duke's mother, the Duchess of Aosta all laughed merrily.

Even the discomfited duke, brushing water from his eyes and trying to wring out his waterlogged clothes, grinned with the rest and made light of the incident. King Alfonso is 42 years old and the duke is 30. Princess Beatriz will be 21 on June 22.

Friends of the royal family considered that the prank indicated the extent to which Prince Aymon, the duke's also known, has won the esteem and affection of the Spanish monarch. In some quarters it lent additional credence to persistent rumors of a romance between the Infanta and the Italian.
