D. A. R. Excludes Prohibition Question From Platform—WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—The daughters of the American Revolution today definitely excluded the prohibition question from its platform by reaffirming its platform of 1912 and 1914 declaring it the policy of the society to avoid all controversial subjects of a religious and political nature.

When the resolution was read to the 29th continental congress, Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook, honorary president-general, who urged the members to support prohibition at the opening session Monday, rose on the platform and remarked:

"Nobody has lived up to that resolution to avoid controversial subjects. I would suggest that we live up to that resolution."

She turned to the resolutions committee chairman, Mrs. Robert J. Johnson, city manager of Emmaholt, Iowa, and reiterated her belief that a clause asking members to live up to their creed be inserted in the resolution to avoid controversial subjects.

The congress adopted the resolution without any further discussion, however. Mrs. Cook in her opening remarks had expressed the belief that the daughters of the American Revolution should endorse prohibition, and had said that in spite of the polls being taken by newspapers and magazines resulting in the showing of wet sentiment, she believed the country was still dry.

Under a suspension of the rules, Mrs. Charles B. Duff, of Tennessee, today withdrew her name from the contest for honorary vice president general and the convention elected Mrs. Duff as the candidate, Mrs. Eliza Perry Leary, of Seattle, Wash.

Liberty Of The Press Necessary, Speaker States—WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Urging passage of his bill to restrict the power of judges to cite a person for contempt and then try the case, Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, today told the American Society of Newspaper Editors that a throttled press is a prophecy of democracy's disintegration.

"The bill, before the senate judiciary committee, would give a person the right to have the case heard by another judge if the contempt arises from an attack upon the judge who brings the action," Vandenberg, a former newspaperman, referred to the action against editors of the Cleveland press in which the decision of a judge who convicted them of contempt was set aside by a higher court.

The Michigan senator said the press does not deserve license but "it must have liberty."

"This liberty, in turn always must be strictly responsible in law for its acts," he added. "Otherwise we should escape from one tyranny only to embrace another, but so important is the preservation of incensored and unafraid opinions in the body of the press that we confront the inevitable need to write a warrant for the surest possible justice when its responsibility is called to account."

Referring to the action of courts in setting persons for contempt and then sitting in judgment, the senator said:

"Mild powers are the formula for tyranny. Powers thus mingle when the same judge acts first as complainant, then as an umpire, in a proceeding which primarily involves his own personal status and his own personal feelings as differentiated from the status and authority of his court."

TO HEAR COMPLAINTS—Salem, Ore., April 18 (AP)—Hearing of complaints that have been made against the administration of J. Lyman Stead as superintendent of the Oregon school for the deaf was today set by the state board of control for Friday, April 28. Some parents of pupils and teachers have complained that Stead was too harsh in his discipline.

12 Burned Bodies Taken From Ruins—MANILA, Apr. 18 (AP)—Twelve badly burned bodies, said dispatches today from Iloilo, were recovered from areas of Northern Occidental Negro province, devastated by fires that began Tuesday and burned two days. Five thousand persons were reported destitute, needing food and shelter. The damage was estimated at \$2,500,000.

Assistant Manager Pope of the Insular Lumber company said that the company's entire plant was destroyed, including 300 company houses.

Besides the lumber company's property, the Gil Lopez sugar central which is near Fabrica, the small lumber town in which the saw mill was located, was damaged \$100,000 and the Wing Kee store at Fabrica \$80,000.

The letter from Stuyton to Wood said in part:

"This is absolutely confidential. Judge Graham, who is, I suppose, thinking not only of the wet and dry issue, but also of the republican party, which he very dearly loves, has shown that these matters are so close to his heart that he has personally urged me to do three things:

"1.—To ask General Atterbury to come down and go to the stand for a few minutes on Wednesday or Thursday. Why will he be made for him instantly not he will not be detained.

"2.—To put Judge Graham himself in touch with Mr. Pierre Dupont in Florida. Mr. Dupont went there yesterday to stay until the 25th of this month; but Judge Graham is going to ask him to come back here and testify on the 19th or 20th.

"3.—The judge also is going to reach Senator Wadsworth in Cuba by phone and ask him to break up his vacation and come back for the same purpose."

"I cannot ask you too strongly to impress upon General Atterbury that Judge Graham thinks the three above mentioned things of vast importance to the cause."

INSECTICIDE FUMES FATAL TO CHILDREN—SEATTLE, Apr. 18 (AP)—Coming into her apartment at the motor hotel at 4 p. m. today, Mrs. Ida Stuehr found her six-year-old daughter Ruth dead, and her son Leonard 8, dying from fumes of an insecticide, used to fumigate their apartment yesterday. A third child, Edward, 16, asleep in an apartment next door was unharmed.

The mother, screaming and crying was taken to police headquarters, looked on an open charge and jailed.

Leonard died a few minutes after his mother discovered the tragedy in the city emergency hospital.

Mrs. Stuehr, a dancing instructor, tucked the three children to bed last night, believing the place had been thoroughly aired, she said. Ruth and Leonard were in one large bed and Edward on a couch. When he became cold during the early part of the night he left the room and got in bed in the next apartment which they had used while their own was being fumigated.

Woman's Rights? She's Hunting 'Em—DETROIT, Apr. 18 (AP)—Mrs. Lena Lakritz has her dander up and she doesn't intend to pay her husband, Wolf Lakritz, the \$3 a week alimony ordered by the court several weeks ago. Furthermore she says she won't buy her husband a new \$100 set of teeth, as the court ordered—not until all available legal moves have been used up.

Judge Maurice McMahon recently heard Wolf's plea for a divorce and entered a temporary order requiring Mrs. Lakritz to pay his board and room, give him \$3 a week and furnish him with a new set of teeth, the cost not to exceed \$100.

NEGRO PROWLER CAPTURED—PENDLETON, Ore., Apr. 18 (AP)—Frank Williams, alias Bob Williams, Negro prowler suspect, who escaped from jail yesterday, was captured last night in a cemetery near here. A deputy sheriff shot him in the heel before Williams submitted to capture.

BOOKS, RECORDS SEIZED—LOS ANGELES, Apr. 18 (AP)—Books and records of the Pacific Copper company were seized today by investigators from the district attorney's office, where it was stated the grand jury was probing information concerning an alleged "pool agreement which may equal" those brought to light in the J. Paul Petroleum corporation stock over issue swindle.

Heflin To Appeal To Alabama Voters—WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Senator Heflin, of Alabama, issued a statement today asserting he would go to Alabama immediately to appeal to the voters from the decision of the supreme court upholding the ruling of the democratic state committee that those who failed to support Alfred B. Smith in 1928 were ineligible to run for office on the democratic ticket.

The senator said he would go to Alabama with in a few days but he would first discuss the case in the senate.

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
