Olmstead May Be Free By June 1

PORTLAND, April 19 (AP)—Officials said today they believed Emory Olmstead, former president of the defunct Northwestern National bank, now serving a prison sentence at McNeil Island, would be paroled by June 1. Eligibility for parole by May 15 was made possible Friday by com-

mutation of Olmstead's sentence to three years, ordered by President Hoover.
