CHAPERONAGE

"Shall I allow my 15-year-old daughter to go to the movies without being chaperoned?"
The question is one which in one form or another is always being asked by mothers and to which, like most vexing problems, there is no single ready-made answer.
If it is possible to make the girl accept chaperonage without resentment or the feeling that her pleasure is being spoiled by the presence of an older person there is, of course, no further question. Whether or not, however, an adolescent girl feels that her mother's or father's presence spoils the spirit of the occasion depends entirely on the quality of the relationship which has been established between her and her parents throughout her growing years.
If her training has been such as to make for obedience and submission to authority without giving her a chance to develop gradually her own standards of conduct, she is likely at adolescence to rebel against anything which represents parental authority.
Such a child, if she has any spirit at all, will find ways of evading even the most vigorous chaperonage.
If, on the other hand, she has been brought up in an atmosphere which has helped her to form her own standards and to acquire a reasonable amount of discretion and good judgment, she is less likely to feel that a good time is blighted by the presence of her elders.
Indeed, she quite naturally brings her friends home and accepts her parents' presence at a show or a party without feeling that they are there to keep a watchful eye on the proceedings.

A. P. Wire Twice Around World In About Two Hours

NEW YORK, April 19 (AP)—Passing through every sea and continent in the universe and relayed in 22 foreign bureaus of the Associated Press and Reuters, the British news agency, a message has twice encircled the world in the amazing time of two hours and five minutes.
The message was sent on March 31 by the Associated Press to test the speed of the wire and cable services at its disposal throughout the world.
The result of the test was not announced until the eve of the annual Associated Press meeting which opens here Monday.
The 18 Associated Press and Reuters bureaus in the important foreign cities had been notified beforehand of the test. Receiving the message: "Associated Press," the bureau named immediately dispatched it on to the next prearranged relay point. "Associated" is the cable address of the Associated Press, and "Reuters" the cable address of Reuters, the general manager.

Starting from the New York general offices of the Associated Press, the six-word message was dispatched to London and in less than a minute after it had been received there was on its way to Madrid.
"That very minute she looked up and saw the microphone over her head was perhaps the most important in her career."

Up in the glassed monitor room, Gavin Duran, voice mixer, listened intently as her words reached him through the recording system. Then he leaned back and grinned at Clarence Brown, the director, who glanced now and again for a sign of approval.
"Anna Christie," coming to the State theater, at last was under way. Garbo was making her first talking picture for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, a debut long awaited by critics and public alike, everyone keenly curious to learn how she talked.

Butter Prices Open Weak; Egg Values Stronger

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 19 (AP)—Butter prices opened weak today, following excessive supplies Thursday and Friday, and in many quarters further reductions were anticipated.

Egg values strengthened as a result of the Easter season, but no advances were announced.
Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The first carload of Texas Bermuda onions received prompt distribution at Portland and Seattle. Portland's quota of the car was cleaned up in short order, at \$5.00 per 50-lb. crate. Future receipts of Texas stock should be less expensive, as shipments are now heavy, with 162 carloads from that state yesterday.

"Asparagus is in light supply due to cool rainy weather which delays cutting and additional carload loading for eastern shipment. The market was firmer at Portland today.

"The potato market is slow in making its expected advances. Terminal markets are well supplied, and some primary points—Texas for example—report lower prices. Daily loadings approximate 700 cars, of which 200 cars are new potatoes.

"One thousand crates of strawberries from California mark the heaviest daily volume of receipts this year. Demand is rather slow, resulting in an accumulation of stocks, and resultant cut rates for over-mature offerings.

"Apple shipments from Washington average about 60 cars daily, a 50 per cent decrease from recent daily volume. Some Washington shippers' stocks are entirely depleted, while many others are quoted on a greatly reduced number of varieties and grades. Prices are firm, but without recent advances."
