**Health Talks**

**TRACHOMA**  
The greatest single cause of vision impairment and blindness in the world is trachoma. Unfortunately, however, it is not widespread in the United States, though it is found in this country among Indians of Arizona and New Mexico and Appalachian and Ozark mountaineers of Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Arkansas.  
Trachoma is found, to some extent, in practically every part of the globe. Its ravages are especially severe in oriental countries. Geographically, it is most prevalent in Egypt and along the borders of the Mediterranean Sea, in Palestine, China, the Balkan states and India.  
The cause of trachoma has not been definitely determined, and some recent studies of its causation raise the question of diet as a possible causative or predisposing factor. Investigations in three or four instances have been promising; the recent studies of Dr. Noguchi in the Rockefeller Laboratories, unhappily curtailed by his untimely death, may lead to results.  
But there is great need for still further study.  
Economic and general health conditions appear to favor the prevalence of trachoma. Where there is poverty, crowding and unsanitary living conditions, trachoma appears to thrive. Even in countries with well-organized and extensive ophthalmic campaigns for the relief and cure of trachoma, it will be materially reduced, until general conditions are improved and sanitary hygiene has developed sanitary living.

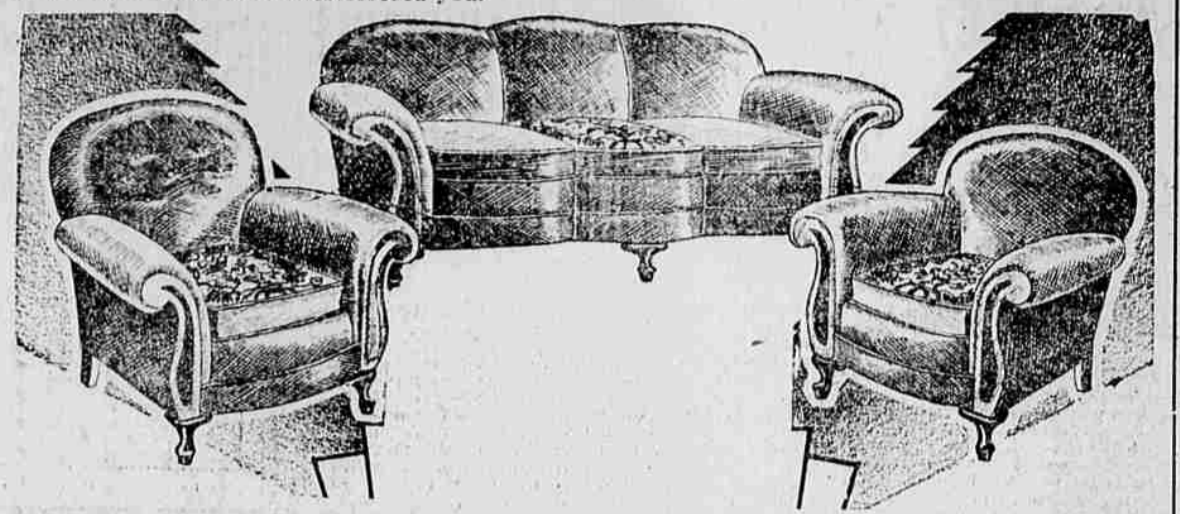

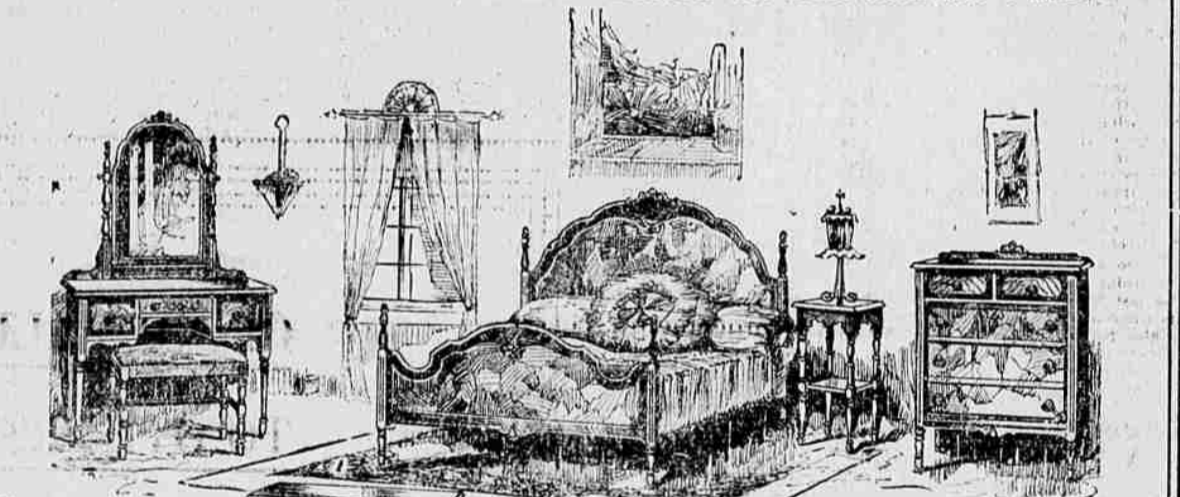
