## A REASONABLE RECIPE

### Cherry Duffs

Drain the juice from a one quart jar of sweetened, red cherries. Half fill buttered muffin tins with this fruit. On each ring place a round of the following dough:

- Two cups flour.
- Four teaspoons baking powder.
- One-half teaspoon salt.
- Two tablespoons sugar.
- One-fourth cup butter.
- Three-fourths cup milk.
- Mix and sift dry ingredients and cut in butter with a knife.
- Add the milk slowly, stirring with a knife to make a soft dough.
- Roll one-half inch thick and shape with biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven for twenty minutes. Serve hot with hard sauce.
- Hard Sauce**
- One-fourth cup butter.
- One cup powdered sugar.
- One teaspoon vanilla.
- One-half teaspoon lemon extract.
- One egg.
- Cream butter, add sugar gradually. Add well beaten egg and Mrs. George Gray of lower Cove has been ill and is at present in La Grande receiving medical attention.

## Milk Bulletin Is Received In The Valley

A very interesting bulletin, whose sole object is the education along the lines of increasing the use of milk and milk products has recently been issued by the extension service of the state college. The contents of the bulletin "Use More Milk, Use Butter, Use Cheese," have been arranged by Mrs. Zella Rodenwald, with a foreword by Ava R. Milan, dean of the school of home economics and Miss Charbel Nye, state leader of home economics extension. More than 4000 copies of the little book have been put in circulation during the last week, going to the lecturers of the state college in Oregon and to the leaders of all cattle clubs. A request has also gone in that copies be sent to the president of each P-T-A organization in the state. The bulletin is the first of a series of pamphlets to be distributed by the extension service as part of the present state-wide campaign to increase the consumption of dairy products. The purpose of the pamphlet is to inform state organizations, in the present dairy situation and the importance of milk in the diet. It furnishes detailed material for a complete program on milk consumption, roll call items, an outline for a twenty-minute talk on the dairy outlook in Oregon, exhibits, material, suggestions for a poster contest, and complete plan for a milk-shake demonstration. In the introduction this statement is made: This home economics extension bulletin recognizes the vital relationship of the dairy industry to the health and prosperity of the commonwealth of Oregon. Recent studies of family expenditures show that the day's meals of the average family include considerably less than an optimum amount of milk. Oregon families may well use more milk. It is fitting therefore that from time to time the attention of the citizens of our state be focused on the nutritive value of dairy products; how they affect growth and physical well-being.

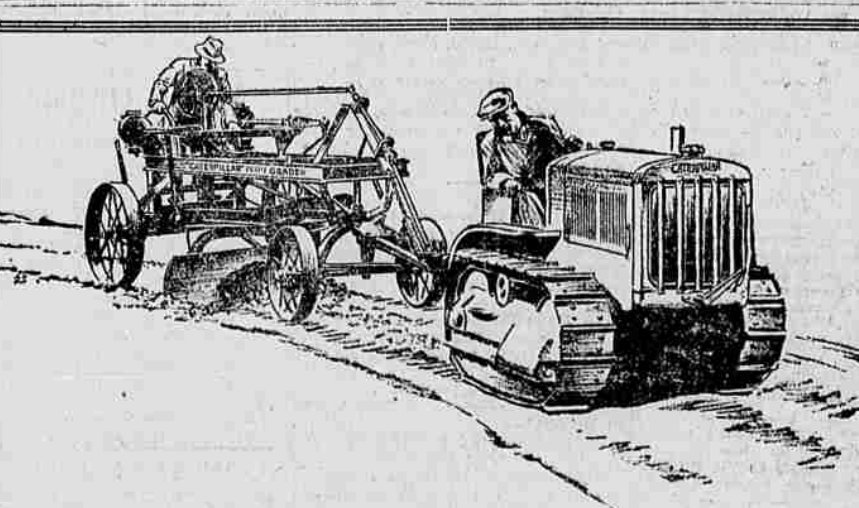
