Davis-Grundy Battle Marks Keystone Tilt

HARRISBURG, Pa., (AP)—Pennsylvania's republican senatorial primary takes rank as one of the year's noteworthy political struggles.

On one side is the power and prestige of William S. Vare of Philadelphia, linked with the popularity of James J. Davis, secretary of labor under three presidents.

On the other is the entrenched influence of the pleasantly persistent Joseph R. Grundy, the junior senator, out to keep his seat.

Grundy, too, is supported by the Mellon political interests.

As a result of the balloting, May 20, Pennsylvania foresees the possible emergence of a single figure who will assume the mantle of the late Boies Penrose as "boss."

It is around Davis, who opposes Grundy for the senatorial nomination, and "Uncle Joe" that the battle of Pennsylvania's political giants swirls.

As a direct offshoot of the senatorial struggle, the republican gubernatorial fight has developed warmly. There are two candidates.

Francis Shunk Brown of Philadelphia, is aligned with the Vare forces. The other is Gifford Pinchot, Pennsylvania's chief executive from 1922 to 1926.

Prohibition could not be kept out of the campaign and an entire wet slate is in the field, headed by Francis H. Bohlen, University of Pennsylvania professor, for senator, and Thomas W. Phillips Jr., Butler, for governor.

The democratic party has an unopposed slate for high state offices. Sedgewick Kletler, Lock Haven, democratic national committeeman, seeks the senatorial nomination and John Hemphill of West Chester is out for governor.

The senatorial fight was marked by an early schism in republican ranks, with the Philadelphia organization supporting Davis and the regular state republican body going for Grundy. Philadelphia's vote is a rich stake. In 1928, the republican majority in the city was 426,000.

Vast Plain Is Storehouse Of Haiti's Wealth

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP)—On the edge of this seaport, extending back to the border of Santo Domingo, lies the plain of the Cul de Sac which American agricultural experts here term the future "gold mine" of Haiti.

Rich in potential export wealth, something of which Haiti now has nothing, the vast plain is only sparsely planted with products capable of being sold in other lands, and it awaits the hand of the developer.

Except for some sugar and coffee, Haiti consumes all its products, and imports much besides. The American experts are trying to convince the country that it never will amass any degree of wealth and get into the prosperous class unless it develops an export trade.

These men advise the careful and planned planting of such export products as can be marketed satisfactorily, and they believe the Cul de Sac is an excellent spot to put such plans into operation. There are other larger valleys awaiting development, but this one is nearer to the ships and close to civilization.

Corn, sugar cane, coffee, bananas, tobacco, and similar products could be raised to much advantage, and cotton of an excellent fiber would well repay the effort to plant it in large quantities, say the Americans.

The experts have been trying to get the Haitians to take corn in hope they will get enough to export. Several special types of corn have been developed on various agricultural extension farms. The chief difficulty is educating the peasant, who takes his few pounds to market and lets it go at that. The foreign experts are convinced someone with vision will have to do the developing.

An instance of development here on a large scale is a large sisal plantation near Cap-Haitien in the north of Haiti. There 1,500 natives raise sisal of a standard type for export, but it probably will be a few years before this experiment is turned into cash.

Though the government and the American advisers insist the taxes are negligible, the tobacco and alcohol taxes have cut down production to these two products. The people detest them as a matter of principle, and even after President Hoover's investigating commission left, large placards denouncing the taxes remained in prominent places all over Haiti.

Chinese Pirates Raid Jap Vessel

TOKYO, April 23 (AP)—Reports received by the navy office here today said Chinese pirates had raided the Japanese freighter Kamuyoshi Maru, which ran aground about 35 miles off Swatow.

The crew of the freighter, numbering 30, was missing. Japanese war craft were sent to search nearby shores and islands.

PRISON POPULATION 803

SALEM, Ore., April 23 (AP)—The population total at the Oregon state prison was rapidly approaching the 800 mark today when Warden James Lewis announced an actual count of 803 prisoners, with six more scheduled to arrive from Jackson county during the day, and probably one or two other counties to report.

Americans Run Away With Style, Paris Finds

PARIS (AP)—One of those international misunderstandings has arisen over waistlines.

Summertime down the glist of the business is that America has pulled in its collective waistline and Paris hasn't.

Paris took a hitch in its belt last fall, found it wasn't generally becoming to French women, and let it out again.

Not so America, where women seem to come taller, leaner and flatter.

The pulled-in belt is one of the outstanding features of spring coats and suits as presented to the American women. Moreover American women seem to like them, judging from reports which reach Paris of the success of belted models.

But when Paris shows 19 belted coat and suit models America is showing 50.

It was the same way when capes and cape sleeves were first launched months back.

Dipping hemlines and eventual long skirts were the same story. So were puff sleeves and elbow sleeves.

The haute couture, some of whose members are having a bad spring season financially, according to rumors which permeate the entire fashion trade of Paris, is beginning to sit up and ask who makes the styles anyway.

Of late Paris, new ideas have been coming back from America multiplied in power and numbers, with such rapidity that dress-makers' breath is taken away.

Analytical couturiers have figured it out this way.

The American woman is not afraid to try something new, whether it's a new ideal of athletic figure, sunbanned skin, ankle length skirts or natural waistline.

The women of Europe are essentially conservative and the more aristocratic and influential they are socially the slower they are to adopt new styles.

Thus while European women, as a whole, are thinking about it, American women have already put the new styles into everyday practice, with the result that sometimes a style is old in New York before it reaches the general public in Paris.

Airplane Wrecks Take Heavy Toll Over The World

Cairo, Egypt, April 23 (AP)—The airplane on which the Prince of Wales traveled here from Khartoum last week crashed this morning at Heliopolis airdrome shortly after taking off on its return flight to Khartoum. Its occupants were killed.

The machine was one of a number of air force planes which the prince had used on returning from his African hunting trip.

WARRENTEENDE, Germany, April 23 (AP)—Captain Jensen, pilot of a Danish naval plane, and Mechanic Bressendorf were killed last night in the crash of their plane on the Baltic sea. Captain Jensen's body was found today.

Officials of the aviation training school said the naval plane

was flying about 150 miles an hour when it hit the water with terrific force, the impact demolishing the plane.

LYON PARK, Va., April 23 (AP)—Henry Trager, of Wheaton, Md., was killed yesterday when his plane crashed while on a test flight for a pilot's license.

PITTSBURGH, April 23 (AP)—Harry S. Lyle and Richard E. Gibson, both of Pittsburgh, were killed yesterday when their plane crashed on a wooded hillside across the Allegheny river from Oakmont.
