Sultanic Palaces on Bosphorus Are Problem to Turkish Republic

ISTANBUL (AP)—Wanted by the Turkish republic, suggestions on how to make republican use of five imperial palaces.
When Mustafa Kemal began his creation of a new Turkey he solved the problem of the sultans by the simple process of exiling the last shadowy occupant of the Ottoman throne. But after eight years he has not solved the problem of what to do with the sultans' dwellings. Minor summer palaces of princes, princesses and pashas are being rented to the Turkish equivalents of Tom, Dick and Harry, for ten dollars a month, with few takers even at that price, or are being utilized as tobacco factories or orphanages. But over five of the six sultanic palaces in Istanbul question marks hover.

Only one of the six has found a definite new destiny. The oldest and most famous, the Seraglio built by Sultan Mohammed, conqueror of Constantinople, in 1453, has been transformed into a museum. The residence of the last caliph, the enormous rococo pile of Dolmabahce (Stuffed Garden), so huge that its marble quay stretches for 1500 feet along the Bosphorus, has been put into sporadic use as a summer residence for Mustafa Kemal. But now that the ghid has built himself a summer capital at Yalova, he is not likely to use the palace again as a dwelling.

Health Talks
SLEEP FOR CHILDREN
Sleep, no less than food, is essential for proper growth and development of the child. In fact, it is one of the three essentials for child health—the other two being right food in sufficient quantities and outdoor play. But how much sleep should a child have? This may be answered in both a general and in a concrete manner. The younger the child, the more sleep it needs. When the child is growing fast, sufficient sleep is essential. Also, the more active the child the greater the need for rest and slumber. Sleep allows growth. Activity being reduced to a minimum, the body's energies, the food consumed and assimilated, may be applied to building tissues, instead of supplying energy for activity as is the case when the child is up and about. While the child, in a sense, is constantly growing, there are two periods when growth is especially rapid. A baby during its first year of life grows very fast, and hence sleeps most of the time. Growth is slower thereafter, until about the age of twelve when the child enters the adolescent stage. Growth then speeds up again, and the boy or girl again has need for more sleep. The amount of sleep for the average healthy child should be as follows: 20 to 22 hours daily at birth. At six months of age, a minimum of 16 hours each day should be had. Sixteen hours daily will suffice for the child one year of age. From two to five years, 14 hours daily will suffice. From then until the age of 12 an average of 11 hours sleep daily will help keep the child healthy. During the puberty period, ten to 12 hours is a safe minimum, and thereafter until maturity an average of nine to ten hours is safe. The child's sleep should be unbroken. During infancy and childhood, 6 o'clock is the ideal bedtime hour.

May Become College
The Italian manager went bankrupt, and the shutters of Yildiz are closed again while the government debates the possibility of turning it into a college for girls, the first Turkish rival to the American college for women further up the Bosphorus. Turkey's newly inaugurated "tourist policy" includes the scheme of turning other palaces into hotels, but the falling off in the number of visitors this year has temporarily shadowed this project. If the tourist trade and Turkey's business in general pick up, hotels may still be made of the beautiful marble palace of Beylerbey where Empress Eugenie once lodged as magnificent guest of the Ottoman empire and where gruesome Abdul Hamid died; of the palace of

Theregan, reduced to a marble skeleton by the fire of 1910, but a skeleton whose every bone speaks of splendor; and of the smaller charming Bosphorus palace of Gueuk-Sou (Sly Water) which stands at the mouth of the Sweet Waters of Asia.

TUNA, FLORIDA STYLE, FOR DINNER

Tuna, Florida Style, Serving 6
(This is also suitable for a luncheon dish)
1 cup diced carrots.
2 tablespoons chopped onions.
1 cup peas.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1 cup water.
Mix ingredients. Cook over moderate fire 25 minutes. Drain and add to tuna mixture.
Tuna Mixture
4 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons flour.
2-3 cups milk.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1-4 teaspoon pepper.
1 cup tuna.
2-3 cup crumbs.
2 tablespoons butter, melted.
Melt 4 tablespoons of butter and add flour. Mix well and add milk. Stir frequently to prevent lumping. Add salt, pepper, tuna and cooked vegetables. Pour into shallow, buttered baking pan and cover with crumbs, mixed with melted butter. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.
Fruit Salad, Spring Style
1 cup diced grapefruit.
1 cup diced pineapple.
1 cup diced orange.
1-4 cup red cherries.
Mix and chill fruits. Serve in cups of fresh lettuce and top with salad dressing.
Strawberry Meringue Pie
1 baked pie shell.
3 cups washed, hulled berries.
1-2 cup sugar.
3 egg whites.
1-4 cup confectioner's sugar.
1-2 teaspoon lemon extract.
Mix berries and 1-2 cup of sugar. Pour into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until very stiff, add 1-4 cup confectioner's sugar and beat until creamy. Add lemon extract. Roughly spread egg white mixture over the berries. Bake 20 minutes in slow oven.
If berries are not very sweet more sugar will be required.

SUMMER CLOTHING

The children's clothing displayed in shops grows every year more charming, but irreproachable as it is from the point of view of good taste, it still, for warm weather at least, falls short of the ideal clothing for little children.

Two or three dress-up outfits are all that any child needs of the regular clothing one finds on display in the shops. The perfect summer clothing for the young child disposes with underwear, garters, sleeves, buttons and fastenings of any sort. For my own little 5-year-old girl, I devised a type of clothing which was practical and attractive and which required a minimum of fuss while it gave a maximum of exposure to the sun.

It was a three piece suit composed of a pair of tiny triangular trunks made with a yoke across the front and elastic across the back; a sleeveless slip over-blouse, cut low front and back and a pair of nicely fitted overalls.

We often started the day dressed in all three garments, shedding first the overalls and then the blouse as the day grew warm and sunny. The trunks alone were the best sort of sun suit, for they allowed far more exposure to the sun's rays than those with straps and net work which are bought ready made in the stores. The outfit may be made of linen or gingham or any sturdy, washable material.

Two pairs of extra jersey trunks, a few soft sweaters and a wide brimmed hat for very hot days were all that my child wore throughout the pleasant season of last year.

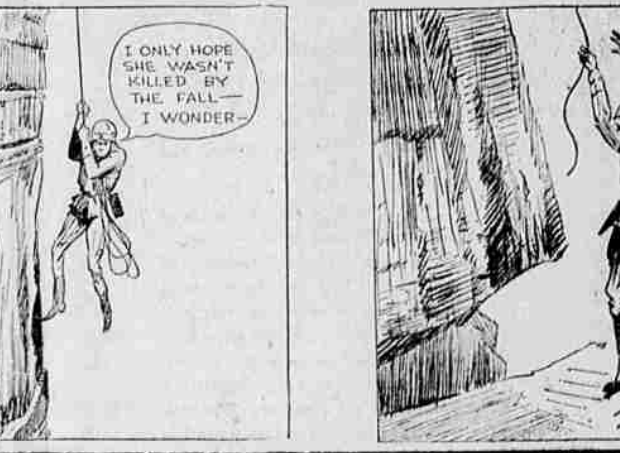
