

WHEAT MEN ORGANIZE AT ALICEL MEET

Purpose is for Marketing
in Co-operating Manner
And to Secure Loans.

LOAN LIMIT IS
EXTENDED 10 DAYS

Permanent Organization
Will be Made as Soon as
Corporation is Given
State Approval.

Tentative organization of the Union County Grain Growers, Inc., with headquarters in La Grande, was perfected at a meeting at Alicel last night attended by approximately 25 wheat growers. The organization papers were sent to the state corporation commissioner last night and as quickly as they are approved, permanent directors will be elected and the organization will begin to function. Temporary directors were elected last night.

The local group will be affiliated with the National Grain Growers, Inc., and the purpose of the corporation is for the marketing of grain in a co-operative manner. One of the features is to secure loans on wheat from the national corporation.

Time Limit Extended
Under the present ruling of the Farmers National Grain association, a member can secure a loan on his 1929 crop on a basis of \$1.15 per bushel less freight to Portland and storage charges. According to the Associated Press dispatch, the time limit for securing such loans in the Pacific northwest has been extended 10 days beyond April 30, so that May 10 will now be the last day. This will allow members of the Union county organization to take advantage of this loan.

Loans may also be made on the 1930 crop, according to E. R. Ringer, La Grande attorney who was in attendance at the meeting at Alicel.

Ringier, of Pendleton, a director of the North Pacific Grain Growers association, was at Alicel explaining the operation of the marketing act and helping to complete the local organization. Accompanied by Ernest DeLong and Grover Grinnett, Mr. Ringer has visited several farms in the valley in the last two days to answer questions on the proposed association.

The Union county association has 150,000 bushels of wheat signed. Blankets will be available to wheat men who desire to sign up either at the two La Grande banks or at the county agent's office.

One might have called it "deed" night at the city commission session last evening in the municipal building, inasmuch as giving and taking of deeds to property figured in the most important feature of the executives' work.

President A. P. Hill reported that the deed to the property the city gave to the state for the use of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, had been turned over to the state following settlement of taxes, etc.

It was also stated that the city had received deeds to the property of the La Grande Tennis club in West La Grande, and also to the Claude C. Pratt property near the Second street viaduct, originally purchased for the erection of a swimming tank, but later the project was abandoned.

Third Court Talked
Some discussion concerned a third court, to be located on a piece of city-owned property adjoining the present courts. Park Taylor was appointed by Mr. Hill as caretaker of the courts.

Mr. Hill suggested that all city property abstracts be brought down to date and this was authorized by motion.

After some discussion, a soft drink license was granted W. A. Smith at Depot and Jefferson, also a transfer of licenses held by Harry C. Phass to Mr. Smith.

City Recorder J. E. Stearns announced that a list of property offered for sale because of delinquent city taxes was in the hands of the printers.

Lamp Shades Of Art Type Made In La Grande

What was merely a hobby that she supposed would earn pin money, has turned into a home industry that is threatening to force them into larger quarters to take care of all the orders. Pittenger, of La Grande, who makes art lamp shades with real butterflies and ever-lasting flowers for decorations, let an enthusiastic salesman who realized their possibilities take the shades "on the road."

The shades are made of fibroilid, a transparent form of celluloid that will not flame when contacted with heat. Real everlasting flowers, milkweed floss and butterflies are arranged in a pretty pattern on one sheet of fibroilid, held in place by another sheet on top and fastened to the frame by braid. ONLY TWO MORE DAYS REMAIN TO COMPLETE LA GRANDE'S CENSUS

With enumerators making their final drive for any person or persons who have not yet been counted in the 1930 La Grande census, no definite announcements were forthcoming today from district headquarters at Pendleton. Raymond O. Williams, however, indicated that a definite statement may be made either Saturday or Monday, and this—when it is issued—will probably be the final figure for La Grande's population as of April 1.

Local people are optimistic that the 8,000 mark will be passed, but realize that a thorough checking up must be made in order to achieve this figure.

Several more names were called in to The Observer this morning and last night and were relayed on to Pendleton. Five names were turned in that apparently had been missed besides the name of a person whose residence was not given and who may be outside of the city limits.

The preliminary total issued Tuesday gave La Grande a population of 7,970 and the remainder of this week was allowed for final checking, before issuing a final figure.

Any one living within the city limits as of April 1 who has not been counted must report before Saturday evening in order to be included in the count, and they are urged to notify The Observer as soon as possible. The Observer is still offering 10 cents per name to youngsters for names of an uncounted persons within the city limits.

Walla Walla, 14,511
Additional reports are being received from other cities. Walla Walla's preliminary figures show a decrease. These figures indicate a population of 14,511 compared with 15,811 in 1920. Exclusion of Whitman college students and prisoners at the state penitentiary from the city lists while they were in the population 10 years ago account for a portion of the decrease.

Figures for Colfax, Wash., also were announced. The Whitman county town having 7,743 compared to 9,027 in 1920.

Associated Press reports from Western Oregon today included: Cottage Grove: 2,472, increase 553, or 28 per cent. Toledo: 2,132, increase 1,454 or 214 per cent.

He came to La Grande to manage the Stone Cash store and with the formation of the MacMarr corporation became manager of the retail stores for MacMarrs throughout Union and Wallowa counties, which position he held until he resigned to start this new business venture.

PRISONERS IN COLUMBUS ON THE WARPATH

Serious Situation Threatens
in Ohio Penitentiary Today.

HUNDREDS OPENLY DEFY GUARDSMEN

Only Actual Violence is
First Fight—Convicts
Incensed by Death of
318 Convicts.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 24 (AP)—A serious situation threatened in the Ohio penitentiary this afternoon as half of the 2000 prisoners in two cell blocks openly defied guards, but there was no actual violence except one fist fight.

Unruly convicts, incensed by the death of 318 prisoners who were burned and suffocated in their locked cells Monday night, urged other prisoners to take a chance, but after Deputy Warden J. C. Woodward talked to the men they quieted down.

The general spirit of unrest continued, however, and officials feared further trouble.

The prisoners continued outspoken in condemnation of Warden Preston Thomas and several

GRANTS PASS, Ore.—Josephine county authorities today continued an investigation into the desecrating of tombs of war veterans in Sloan cemetery, oldest burying place in Josephine county.

With an apparent spite against graves of war veterans, the vandals within the last few nights have wrecked practically all tombstones in the cemetery. Two graves, which hold the remains of persons who died more than 100 years ago, were trampled and the shrubbery was torn.

PRESIDENT TAKES HAND IN TARIFF

Sides With Senate Chiefs
And Approves Direct
Vote by the House.

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Taking a hand in the tariff controversy, President Hoover at a conference with republican congressional leaders today sided with senate chiefs and approved a direct vote by the house on the controversial export-debenture provision put in the bill by the senate over his objection.

The congressional pilots attended a breakfast conference with the president after the senate and house leaders had quarreled over which branch should set first on the tariff bill differences between them which were left unsettled by their conferees.

Senator Watson, Indiana, the majority leader, insisted the house act first. House republicans were reluctant to submit to this procedure.

Sides With Watson
Mr. Hoover listened to the discussion and sided with Watson. Accepting the decision, the house will take up the conference report a week from today. Separate votes will be in order on the senate's proposal for the export-debenture farm relief principle and on the senate's modification of existing flexible tariff provisions.

Both propositions were voted in to the bill by the coalition of senate democrats and western republican independents over the expressed opposition of the president.

Attendants at the White House breakfast party reported that none of the rates was discussed.

After the White House conference, house members from 15 sugar-producing states began plans to insist on as high protection as possible for the sugar growers and refiners.

The house bill increases the existing duty on Cuban raw sugar from 1.75 to 2.40 cents a pound. The senate measure provides a 2 cent rate.

FOUR BURNED TO DEATH IN BOONEVILLE

BOONEVILLE, N. Y., April 24 (AP)—Four persons were burned to death and a fifth was missing in a fire which destroyed the large colonial home of Bert Cronk, coal dealer here, early today.

Mr. and Mrs. Cronk and Mrs. Paul Ann and her young daughter were said by firemen to have died in the flames.

Clifford, young son of the Cronks, leaped from a window to safety. He was suffering from effects of the smoke.

Railroad Requests Granted by I. C. C.

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Permission for the Southern Pacific company to abandon parts of its line in Washington, Yamhill and Multnomah counties, Oregon, was given today by the interstate commerce commission.

At the same time the commission authorized the Oregon Electric railway to construct an extension from its line to Cascadia, a distance of 40 miles, and to build three branches totaling 25 miles in Linn county.

KEEP LAKES OPEN

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—The state game commission has decided that all lakes of the state with the exception of Tahkenitch, Sit, Coos, Collier and Clear lakes will be left open this year to all kinds of fishing. The commission's action followed numerous requests of sportsmen.

A month ago the commission decided to close 11 lakes to the fishing of bass, catfish, perch, catfish and sunfish. At the request of sportsmen, however, only the four lakes will be closed and those between April 15 and July 1, when a study of spawning conditions of the fish named will be undertaken.

Grade Crossing Crash At Canby Fatal To Five

Four Burned to Death
Last Night and Fifth
Dies Today in Oregon
City Hospital.

OREGON CITY, Ore., April 24 (AP)—The death toll in the automobile-Southern Pacific locomotive crash near Canby, Ore., late yesterday mounted to five today with the death in a hospital here of Irene Evans, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Evans, New Era, Ore., residents, who were killed in the crash.

Maude Anthony, 27, New Era, daughter of Herman Anthony, 70, wealthy New Era farmer, who was killed also in the wreck, was reported to have improved slightly, although the burns she suffered when the automobile caught fire may cause her death.

FOUR BURNED TO DEATH
CANBY, Ore., April 24 (AP)—Four New Era residents were killed and two were injured, one probably fatally when a speeding automobile truck driven by J. W. Evans crashed head-on into a Southern Pacific freight locomotive at the Canby-Mollala crossing on the Pacific highway north of here yesterday afternoon. Five followed the crash, the victims being burned to death. The dead: J. W. Evans, New Era, engaged in plumbing business at Oswego; Mrs. Agnes Evans, his wife; Herman Anthony, 70, wealthy farmer and bee keeper.

James Linn, brakeman on the freight train, attributed the collision to high speed on the part of the Evans automobile at a time when rain probably obscured his vision. The freight engine was backing across the Pacific highway on the Canby-Mollala way, out on the main line. Linn was standing on the rear of the engine.

The train crew hurried to the wreckage and sought to extricate the victims and a call was sent to the Canby fire department.

Edda Mussolini And Count Ciano Married In Rome

ROME, April 24 (AP)—Benito Mussolini, premier and dictator of Italy, this morning gave his daughter Edda in marriage to Count Galeazzo Ciano, secretary of the Italian embassy at the holy see and son of the minister of communications.

The church of St. Joseph, which is 11 acres in area, was crowded with dignitaries. It was decorated for the occasion with beautiful tapestries from the papal palaces, and with palm flowers.

The wedding party drove from the premier's home, Villa Torlonia, to the church, where Signorina Edda led the procession on the arm of her father-in-law, Count Ciano. The groom followed escorted by Donna Rochela Mussolini, while at the last came the premier himself with Countess Ciano.

Premier Mussolini, for the first time since the exchange of ratifications of the Lateran treaty with Cardinal Gasparri last summer, set foot within Vatican City today going to St. Peter's with his daughter, Edda, and her husband, Count Galeazzo Ciano, after the wedding.

The premier's visit came as a complete surprise.

Giant Liner Bremen In Sea Collision

DOVER, Eng., April 24 (AP)—The giant German liner Bremen, sister ship of the record-breaking Europa, was in collision with the tanker Grandeur just off Dungeness in the English channel this morning.

The Bremen, which was outward bound, was reported to have proceeded on her way to Southampton after a search for the tanker in a dense fog in which the crash occurred and was apparently little, if any, damaged.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24 (AP)—State oratory contest finalists will meet here tonight, the winner of which will go to Seattle to try for the Pacific coast championship.

16 AMERICAN MISSIONARIES ARE MENACED

Catholic Fathers in Danger
of Capture and
Death, China.

GIVE ACCOUNT OF REIGN OF TERROR

Officials of Sinfeng,
Priests Report, "Cut
Open Alive" and 200 Inhabitants Slain.

CANTON, China, April 24 (AP)—Two American missionaries who arrived here today from Sinfeng near Kanchow, Kiangsi province, said that sixteen American Catholic missionaries were in grave danger of falling into the hands of "red" troops and possible execution. Kanchow, they said, was near surrender to communists and bandits who had besieged the city since early last month.

Father McLaughlin and Father Moehringner of Brooklyn, N. Y., who arrived here from Sinfeng after traveling afoot and by boat seven days, gave a thrilling account of the reign of terror existing in Southern Kiangsi province. They said that prior to their departure from Sinfeng it was reported Chinese troops were evacuating Kanchow. The fate of that city and its inhabitants was unknown in Sinfeng, only 53 miles south, because communication was cut.

McLaughlin and Moehringner said that red forces were overrunning the entire southern part of Kiangsi, and that they had left Sinfeng as the city was defenseless and their "death was probable if captured."

Whereabouts of other missionaries in the area outside of Kanchow was not known to the two men. They said many of them had been scattered to various places.

Relations developments in Kanchow, the priests said, that from March 15 to March 21 a regiment of Chinese soldiers defended the city against repeated red attacks, in which hundreds of the besiegers were slain with rifles and machine guns as they sought to scale the city walls by ladders.

The reds retreated, turning their attention to lesser places. They lost missions in Southern Kiangsi.

Continuing, McLaughlin and Moehringner said that on April 10, the bandits started toward Mananfu and Sinfeng, the latter city falling into their hands April 12.

All officials of Sinfeng that were captured; said the priests, were "cut open alive" and 200 of the principal inhabitants were murdered.

A soviet form of government was established by the reds, they said. Postoffices were protected to aid in spreading communist propaganda. Telegraph offices were destroyed and their employees killed.

Masked Mob Kills 50-Year-Old Negro

WAHALLA, S. C., April 24 (AP)—A masked mob today lynched Allen Green, 56-year-old negro, charged with attacking a young white woman, after clubbing and seriously injuring Sheriff John Thomas, who tried to protect his prisoner.

Green was dragged from the Oconee county jail, tied to a tree and shot. At Anderson, S. C., where Sheriff Thomas was taken, hospital attaches said his skull was fractured and that he might die.

HITCH-HIKERS HELD

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24 (AP)—Mildred Pederson, nineteen, and Florence Hoover, eighteen, both of Valley City, N. D., were given shelter and lodging at the Women's Protective division of the Portland police department last night after they hitch-hiked from the North Dakota city, starting their trip April ninth.

They said they were en route to San Francisco to visit relatives.

MAY AMEND VETERANS BILL

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—A series of amendments to the Johnson veterans bill were adopted in quick succession by the house today, changing the scope of the measure to provide compensation benefits for all disabilities incurred up to January 1, 1920, instead of January 1, 1925, as proposed in the original bill.

PRISCO GIRL INJURED

SALEM, Ore., April 24 (AP)—With a fair chance for recovery Miss Agnes Brown, San Francisco girl, is in a hospital here today with injuries received in an automobile accident on the river road north of Salem last night. She was in a car with J. Beuley, salesman of Clatskanie, when the car crashed into a culvert.
