Price Reduction
Of One Cent In
Butter Grades

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 24 (AP)—Butter failed to sustain its top-heavy position with the result that a price reduction of 1c was made in three grades at the Portland produce exchange Thursday. This brought extras down to 38c, standards to 37c and prime firsts to 36c. Firsts remained at 34c.

Butterfat also suffered a reduction, the price delivered Portland being cut to 37c.

Egg values were unchanged. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"Trading was slower on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market, probably due to prevalent cool rainy weather. Strawberries, asparagus and cabbage were in slow demand. Asparagus and cabbage were weaker.

"Lettuce is firm at California shipping points, but track supplies at Portland are excessive, and the market is barely steady. Many of Portland's present lettuce supplies are of poor quality.

"Celery and tomatoes are in light supply, and the market is firm.

"Onions are very dull, and are barely steady. Many potato dealers anticipate advances soon, in view of prevalent light shipments, and apparent cleaning up of farmers' storage stocks at all northern shipping districts.

"A few carloads of spinach will be available for shipment from nearby acreage, within the next few days."

In place and the only artificial part of the design is the body of the butterfly. It is hard to describe the shade because it looks like a bit of natural life taken from a garden where flowers are in bloom with butterflies hovering near. The butterflies are imported from various localities over the world. Green, amber, rose and blue are the shades of the butterfly. Once they made a happy discovery that with a yellow light globe the blue turned a beautiful green and the rose a lovely shade of orchid, so all sorts of color possibilities exist in the use of colored globes.

Legal Notice Brings Memories Of
Battle To Death By Two Indians

GRANTS PASS, Ore. (AP)—It was only a legal notice such as the United States government posts when it is necessary to sell government property.

It occupied only an ordinary position on the bulletin board in the Grants Pass post office. But its presence revived the memories of a tragedy and murder that snuffed out the life of one of the most famous Indian chiefs ever to imitate the call of the Rogue River wild turkey.

The bulletin said the government would sell on a certain date a certain piece of property, but to old timers those grizzled veterans of our dough days it revealed that the old stamping grounds of Chief Jump Off Joe was about to revert to the whites, after technically being held in the name of the Indian since 1855.

Great Physical Powers

Chief Jump Off Joe, according to the stories which have been handed down from the days when the call of gold was rampant was a character among the Indians and whites. On many occasions the unusual physical powers and native cunning of the chief made him victor in deadly combat.

It was on the small plot of land, 17 1/2 miles from Grants Pass, that the chief met a man, who if not his enemy, was his equal. It was in the gathering gloom of a night, November night that

murky night when the moon is in the last quarter the death struggle of Jump Off Joe and Pico can be heard from the hill wrapped hills adjoining the creek. It is because of this strange superstition that none of the relatives of the dead chief ever claimed the land.

Trouble in the prison yard was averted by cool headed leaders of the convicts there. Soldiers and naval reserve men remained outside the prison, ready to meet the emergency.
