Salem Minister Will Speak At Lutheran Church

The Rev. P. W. Eriksen in Pulpit Both Morning And Evening—Many Interesting Programs.

An interesting program has been arranged for Sunday in the churches of La Grande, including the opening of a revival series at the Christian church, and talks by the Rev. P. W. Eriksen, of Salem, at the English Lutheran church. Mr. Eriksen will occupy the pulpit both Sunday morning and evening. At the morning worship, beginning at 11 o'clock, he will preach on the subject, "The Highways of God," and in the evening
