CHILLY WEATHER PILES UP GAMES

Only Chicago Cubs Have Been Able to Play All of Their Contests.

Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) The present chill and dampness of spring appears to be storing up trouble for major league baseball teams almost as fast as they are piling up double headers. Only one club so far has played all its games, the Chicago Cubs gaining this honor, while the St. Louis Cardinals and Detroit Tigers have encountered serious consequences with but one postponement apiece.

St. Louis Wins Although St. Louis gained all the glory in the two games that did survive yesterday, the teams owe it to a select few players. George Blumenthal, shagging young outfielder, played the leading role as the Cardinals downed the Cubs, scoring one run and driving in four with a single, two doubles and a sacrifice in four trips to the plate.

Chicago's Blumenthal followed the example of the hero set in the previous inning when he tripped with the bases loaded to bring in three of the five runs St. Louis scored in that inning. Sylvester Johnson hurried the entire game for the Cards.

Bobby Jones Is After British Amateur Title

By Dick Graham (Associated Press Sports Writer) ATLANTA, (AP)—Bobby Jones, who has won nine national golf tournaments in the United States and Great Britain in the last seven years, sets sail late this month on his fourth trip to England and the start of the most ambitious schedule he has tried since 1924. The Atlanta amateur is pointing for the British amateur—the only major crown he has not won. He will enter this tournament, Bobby will lead the American team in the Walker Cup matches with the Staying British team at Sandwich.

After the cup matches, May 15 and 16, and the British amateur at St. Andrews May 24 to 25, Bobby will visit his third British opponent—at Haystack June 14 to 15. He won the tournament in 1924 and successfully defended his championship on his last trip abroad in 1927. There also is a possibility that he may ruble over to Germany and take a shot at the German open.

Play in U. S. Open Less than two weeks after he returns to his native shores, Jones will re-enter the golfing arena at Interlachen in Minneapolis, meeting an array of challengers July 12 to 15 for the United States open title he won last year. He plans to go direct from Minneapolis to Minneapolis for practice.

Then follows the United States amateur championships at the Northern Cricket club in Philadelphia, starting September 22. Bobby's fourth title competition of the season. He hopes to be the first American to win this title five times. He won in 1924, 1925, 1927 and 1929 but lost in the first round in 1927 to Johnny Goodrich, Canada's champion.

Mr. Robert Tyrone Jones Jr., with company for golfing based on his country in Boston, has three children, Clara Malone, 7, and Robert, Tyrone III, 5, will remain at home with their grandparents.

With the Jones party will be Bobby's brother, Al. B. Jones of Atlanta, who has followed the success of the links \$4,000 miles to tournaments in the past 14 years. Bobby kept himself in good condition during the winter by strenuous indoor exercises and is about five pounds lighter than at the start of his 1928 and 1929 campaigns. His weight is about 172 pounds.

Jones will sail with the Walker Cup team on the Massachusetts, April 24.
