SPOKANE (AP)—Between one thousand and fifteen hundred Rotarians of the first district will gather here May 11 for their annual conference with an elaborate program which includes speakers from Washington, Oregon, North Idaho and British Columbia.
The conference, called by A. T. H. Cunningham, district governor, will last four days. It will be made up of general sectional meetings, luncheons, musical programs, banquets and a ball, to say nothing of the golf tournament.

COMPANIONSHIP

There are fathers and mothers who still believe that in order to keep their children's respect they must keep them at a distance. They have the feeling that to meet them as equals is to endanger their authority.

I have always suspected that this attitude was at least partly due to the fact that such parents secretly distrust their ability to win respect by their actual qualities of character, and that they therefore command what they fear they would otherwise not receive.

People whose personal qualities entitle them to the respect of others will receive respect from their children without ever making a point of it.
Children need not only parents who are worthy of respect, but those who are companionable as well. A child needs parents who will play games with him, who will genuinely share his interests, and to whom he may speak without constraint.

He needs parents whose opinions he does not hesitate to question, with whom he may enter a discussion of any sort without fear of being silenced merely because he is a child.

A child needs parents who are not afraid to admit that they make mistakes,—that they may be wrong and he right.

Many a child has been oppressed by a sense of guilt and inferiority, based on the fact that his parents have made him believe that they were always perfect in wisdom and goodness, whereas he seemed naturally prone to error and wickedness of every sort.

You need not fear to be companionable with your child. The child who has a parent whom he not only respects, but considers his friend, is satisfied in at least two essential needs of his nature.
