SUN ECLIPSE TO BE NEXT MONDAY; MAXIMUM 12:35

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partially to spend the noon hour sky-gazing. It is advised by authorities that no one look directly at the sun unless through darkened glass or something that will dull the direct rays, as injury to the eyes may result if no protection is afforded.

This is the second sun eclipse of importance to be seen here during the last 15 years, the other occurring one June day about 12 or 13 years ago.

If heavy clouds obscure the sky the effect of the eclipse is expected to be a total night, with only faintly to be seen, the passing of the moon's shadow across the earth at a minimum. Eclipse will begin at 9:52 a. m. and end at 8:12:35 p. m. The maximum—the time when 86 of the sun will be covered—is scheduled to take place at 12:35 p. m., giving practically everyone an opportunity to see the eclipse.

GEORGE SIMPSON WINS

FRANKLIN FIELD, Philadelphia, Apr. 26 (AP)—George Simpson, "the Buckeye Balder," ran away with the final of the 100 yard race in succession, equalled the listed world's record of 24.3 seconds in this feature of the Penn relay carnival. The Ohio State star won going away by a good six yards from De Armond Houston of Denison (Ohio) college.

Ed Hamm of Georgia Tech, world's champion broad jumper, broke the old Penn relay carnival record today with a leap of 24 feet 3 inches, on one of his first attempts. This displaced the record of 24 feet, 7 1/2 inches made by the late Myer Prinstein of Syracuse in 1909.
