VERDICT FOR \$5,000
DALLAS, Ore., April 25 (AP)—A verdict for \$5,000 damages was awarded the plaintiff in the case of William Hayes, administrator of the estate of Elmer Hayes, vs. John C. Elgou by a jury in circuit Judge Aelle G. Walker's court, which deliberated eight hours.

Elmer Hayes, 29, died in a Dallas hospital as the result of injuries sustained the night of December 12, 1925, when Elgou's car

crashed into a stalled car which Hayes and Irwin H. Holman, a companion about the same age, were pushing along the Hawthorne highway toward Ixodus. Young Holman was fatally injured in the same accident.

Butter Prices Barely Steady As Week Closes

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 26 (AP)—With supplies growing, butter prices gave evidence of closing the week barely steady. Increase in production seems to be an acute problem.

Eggs were barely steady. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"A feature of Portland's fruit supply this week was a few motor truck loads of small C grade Washington apples from Central Washington. This fruit moved to retailers at \$1.50 per box. Extra fancy Washington of desirable sizes continue to sell readily at \$2.00 per box, and higher.

"Strawberries from California display considerably improved quality and advanced to \$2.00 per crate. The absence or presence of sunshine is also a most important factor, seemingly, in the volume of berries moved by wholesalers daily.

"As long as eastern asparagus markets continue satisfactory, as at present, there is little likelihood of lower prices at Portland. The occasional car loaded from Oregon points serves to remove the surplus from the Portland market. Best Oregon asparagus is steady at \$1.25 per dozen 1-lb. bunches.

"Tomatoes advanced to \$5.50 per lug of repacks. Present tomato arrivals are of good quality and sell as high as \$4.75 per lug, in original packages."

SPINACH is also cheap.
