Menus Of The Day

Breakfast Stewed Apples, Chilled Wheat Cereal and Cream Soft Cooked Eggs Buttered Toast Coffee

Luncheon Creamed Eggs and Ham (leftovers) Bread Plum Jelly Coconut Drop Cakes Tea

Dinner Beef Roll Hashed Brown Potatoes Creamed Asparagus Bivalve Currant Jam Cabbage Salad Washington Strawberry Pie Coffee

Creamed Eggs and Ham (Using leftovers) Four tablespoons butter, Four tablespoons flour, Two cups milk.

One-half teaspoon salt, One-fourth teaspoon pepper, One-fourth teaspoon celery salt, Two tablespoons finely chopped onion.

Two hard cooked eggs, sliced, One cup cooked peas, Two-thirds cup (bleed cooked ham (boiled or baked).

Melt butter and add flour. When blended add salt, pepper, celery salt, onion, milk. Cook until creamy. Add other ingredients and cook 20 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

Beef Roll, Using Cooked Beef

Two cups soaked, chopped liver, One cup bread crumbs, One tablespoon chopped onion, One egg.

One-fourth teaspoon salt, One-fourth teaspoon celery salt, Two tablespoons flour, Mix ingredients and shape in roll. Place in small baking pan and add one inch water. Bake 20 minutes. Baste frequently.

Washington Strawberry Pie Four tablespoons butter, One-half cup sugar, One egg.

One-half cup milk, One teaspoon vanilla, One-eighth teaspoon salt, One and one-half cups flour, Two teaspoons baking powder, Three cups berries, washed and hulled.

One-third cup sugar, One cup whipped cream, Cream butter and one-half cup of sugar. Add egg, milk, vanilla, beat three minutes. Pour in round cake pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderately slow oven. Turn out and let cool. Spread top with berries mixed with one-third cup of sugar. Cover with whipped cream. Serve with fork.
