### SENIORS VICTOR IN CLASS TRACK

Wind Slows up Runners—Mires, Nowland, Faus, Conley Score Heavy.

With a chilly wind blowing, causing slower track marks than usual, the second class track and field meet in La Grande High school was run off yesterday afternoon, as the "Tigers" last preliminary to the Eastern Oregon meet at Pendleton Saturday.

21. Nowland's time in the high hurdles was 16.7 and he took the low timbers in 31.4, slow time. Roe, favored to win the low hurdles, fell when he was leading the field by several yards, losing his stride due to misplaced hurdles. The senior relay team stepped out to take first in 1:41.2, fast time for a class team. Evans won the pole vault at 10 feet 4 inches. Faus fell down in the discus which went to Waite, but came back to take first in the shot put and second in the high hurdles and in the broad jump for a total of 20 points. Mires was high scorer with a first in the 440, seconds in the low hurdles and javelin, fifth in the discus, sixth in the shotput for a total of 24 points.

Yesterday, for the fifteenth straight time, the Seals defeated the Senators by a score of 8 to 6. Iyan selected his leading hit, Ray Keating, to subdue the locals, but Ray and his spittail were unequal to the occasion.

Howard Craghead, pitcher, scored the winning run after hitting a double to open the ninth inning.
