## Miss Foley Speaks At Meeting of The Neighborhood Club

Miss Lena A. Foley, of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, speaker in the "Little Theater Movement and Community Dramatics" at the meeting of the La Grande Neighborhood club Tuesday afternoon at the La Grande hotel. She mentioned the present status of the little theater showing many gradual changes since the movement began. She also stated that the "realities" were not the all-inclusive reason for this, but rather a rebirth of legitimate drama through university, college, high school and community productions. This has built up a new and decidedly widespread theatrical system which some leaders hope will eventually become a national organization. Miss Foley pointed out the advantage of such an association. She also explained the activities of the principal little theater groups in America (and beginning in Europe); then of the outstanding exponents of this work in institutions of higher learning.

Miss Foley closed with a brief analysis of the activities of the drama department of the normal school and an outline of what the department is accomplishing. Several of the members were enthralled by this inspirational address that they were heard questioning the speaker as to possibilities of dramatic courses and little theater groups. Miss Foley was introduced by Mrs. Donald Pague, state drama chairman.

Another interesting feature of the program was a series of talks by members, not limited to discussion of whether or not to build a clubhouse, but brought out a large number of constructive programs of activity for next year. Mrs. J. E. Havenscroft informally announced her speakers. The offerings were practical and enthusiastically received.

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
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
