Portland Team, With Mails Pitching, Turns Back Hollywood 4-3.

Miles batted in the first Portland run in the second with a double and then scored himself the same inning. Bob Johnson slugged out a homer with a man on to make it four runs for the Ducks. John Hollywood hunter was responsible for six hits and all four runs while Harvey was found for six hits when he took the mound in the fourth. White Sox Drop To Third Place; Senators Beaten

Among the numerous surprises that have cropped up in the early weeks of the major league campaign must be listed the showing of the Chicago White Sox, Chicago, who Washington, was listed as a probable second division club and has been right up among the American league leaders.

The White Sox were shoved down into third place yesterday as the Detroit Tigers gathered in four runs in the first inning for a 6 to 4 victory, but they still are among the first ranking teams. With four regulars batting in the 300 class and a flock of pitchers working in good form, the White Sox have earned the present rating of 600, gained from six victories and four defeats.

Bill Cassill, current co-leader of the American league, has been the spark plug of the team this season after a few years of rather disappointing performances. He connected with Egan Hognett, Detroit's big Indian hurler of sinker balls, for three of Chicago's 12 hits yesterday, but the rest of the Sox were not able to keep pace with him and produce the required runs.

Senators Blanketed

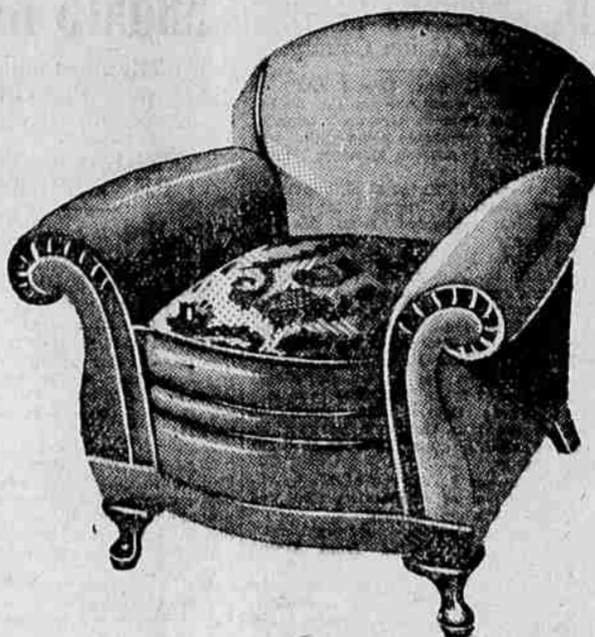

Griffiths Back In Boxing List After Victory

CHICAGO, May 1 (AP)—Tuffy Griffiths, of Sioux City, Ia., today was back on the list of contenders for the world heavyweight boxing championship, the stain of a technical knockout defeat by Jack Gagnon removed from his record by a 16-round decision victory over the Boston sailor last night.

Before 20,550 spectators, most of whom went to the Chicago stadium hoping to learn that Gagnon's stunning victory over Griffiths at Philadelphia early last month was a mistake. The tough one-out-of-three fight here, lost by Griffiths, was a technical knockout by Lewis in the first round that sent Griffiths crashing to the canvas in Philadelphia did little damage although Gagnon kept it busy all evening. It landed on Tuffy's chin in the eighth round but Gagnon couldn't get his man lined up for another shot. Griffiths' long left was in great working order and it kept Gagnon off balance. The sailor never stopped trying and the fight was swinging over Griffiths' head or landing high just as busily at the bell as at the start.

Gagnon failed in his effort to convince that he is among the best in his division, but the job was anything but a financial failure for him. The fight drew a gate of \$72,684, with Gagnon receiving 50 per cent.

Griffiths' triumph probably will lead to a great "match" for the stadium next month. Griffiths' title won't be lost. Von Peral had agreed to meet the winner and Griffiths is expected to sign up soon.

LEWIS HANDS JOHN FREBERG MAT DEFEAT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1 (AP)—The (Stran) Lewis, former heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated John Freberg, Minnesota, in a six-out-of-three fight here last night. Freberg pinned Lewis in the first round with a head scissor

after 30 minutes, 30 seconds. Lewis took the second fall in 19 minutes 40 seconds with rabbit punches and flying headlocks. He won the final fall in less than three minutes with another series of rabbit punches and headlocks.

Tommy Alley took one fall and a decision over Karo Arslan Pasha in the six-round special event andchet Wilder and Harry Demerit wrestled to a draw in the curtain-raiser.

appointment with both the clinical and the pathological results. These examinations indicate that past routine examinations which have been made in at least 20 cases do not reveal any definite specific destruction of cancer tissue or evidence that the progress of the spread of cancer in the bodies of the afflicted patients has been retarded.

Dr. Walter M. Coffey and Dr. John H. Hunter several weeks ago developed a cancer cure and approved Dr. Foshner's warning that patients should not entertain false hopes.

"We have repeatedly stated that we do not claim to treat or cure cancer," they said. They explained that experiments were under way by which they hoped to prove the potency of their extract in the treatment of cancerous tissue.
