Cut In Output Only Solution Timbermen Say

TACOMA, Wash., May 1 (AP)—Absolute curtailment of all night operation and a reduction in the day time output of the northwest lumber mills is the only solution for the present condition of over-production in the lumber market according to opinions expressed at the monthly meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association held here.

While no organized action on the question was taken plane for voluntary curtailment by the mills were outlined by the individual operators. Many of the mills now operating night shifts tentatively agreed to cut down to a single shift six days a week while other mills not now running nights will go on a five day basis.

The lumbermen hope that if a sufficient number of mills will curtail during the next few months the surplus of lumber now on the market will be absorbed and new business and production balanced.

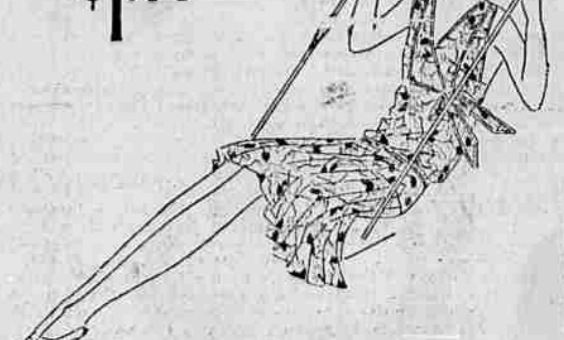

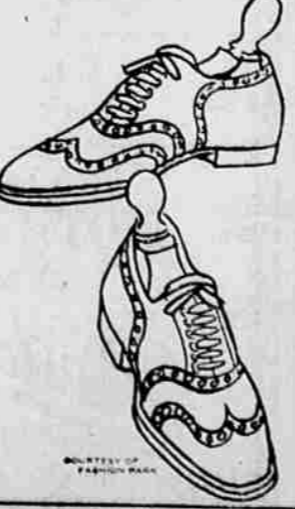
