Health Talks

Growing Old "Grow old along with me. The best is yet to be. The last of life for which the first was made."

So says Browning in "Rabbi Ben Ezra." But these are words to whom, growing old does not signify that "the best is yet to be," particularly those elderly persons who grow increasingly deaf. There is a type of deafness which comes on with age, known as senile deafness. There is a slow loss in the "sharpness" of the hearing sense. At first only the higher notes are missed. The shrill notes of a whistle, or the high pitched tones of a whining bird, fail to register. The lower notes, those used in ordinary conversation, are heard with perfect ease. But with time the deafness progresses and even the lower register becomes hard to catch. True senile deafness may begin as early as sixty, or again may not make its appearance until eighty. In the uncomplicated case, there is no ringing in the ears nor dizziness. There is only an "ever deepening silence."

Not all of the deafness of old age is of the senile type. There are other causes than age and senility that may bring on deafness and certain among these may be treated effectively. There may be a catarrhal condition of the inner tube of the ear or the trouble may have its origin in the nose. Impacted ear wax is not an uncommon cause. The general constitutional condition, too, has its bearing on hearing as well as on other body functions. The removal of centers of infection, such as bad teeth, sometimes work wonders.

Danger of Dwarfs In The Northwest

DR. MONTE, Cal., May 1 (AP)—Dr. George M. Curtis, associate professor of surgery, University of Chicago, in an address here told the California Medical association that a race of dwarfs may spring up in the United States to present unusual medical and social problems. In his talk on cretinism Dr. Curtis pointed out cretinism was a thyroid gland disease definitely associated with goitre and confined principally to mountainous districts. He said cretins or midgets are becoming a problem as their numbers increase in the Alps, Himalayas, Andes, and Carpathian mountains, and asserted there is danger of cretinism in the Pacific Northwest. He urged limitation of water and improved sanitary conditions to prevent further increase in the number of dwarfs and goitre cases in the region.

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Sport Slants by ALAN J. GOULD

At the outset, anyway, it looks like a left-handed season in the major leagues.

The first abbreviated, storm-swept week of the campaign witnessed brilliant pitching performances by Robert Moses Grove of the Athletics, Larry French of the Pirates, Wild Bill Hatcher of the Cardinals, Lester Swadlow of the Phillies, Watson Clark of the Brooklyners, Earl Whitehill of the Tigers and Bill Walker of the Giants—all tossing curves and high hard ones from the port side.

Few teams have ever captured pennants without at least one good left-hander and most of the contenders are well equipped with "cock-eyes" this year. The A's have two of the best in Grove and Whitehill. Grove is a good bet to lead the twelfth of both leagues in all-around performance this year.

The Giants depend on three southpaws, Hubbell, Walker and Trout, to keep them in the race. Elliott and Clark are Brooklyn portside ace. Whitehill is the mainstay of the Tiger staff. The Pirates count heavily upon French and Petty.

The Yankees have Zzachary, wobbly and Tenneck for left-handed round choppers but Tenneck is about through and Zachary, despite an exceptional year in 1929, cannot toil regularly. The Yankees, if they go anywhere in the race this year, must get right-handed effectiveness from Pippan, Hoyt and Eberl.

Southern Methodist university rapidly is striding along the path that leads to a conspicuous place in the national collegiate spotlight. The Mustangs take on Notre Dame and the Navy this year in two of the football schedules outstanding inter-sectional engagements and Ray Morrison, the S. M. U. gridiron mentor, is a central figure in the mid-summer coaching school to be conducted at Dallas, July 1-14.

Flanking Morrison in the assembly of experts engaged for the summer sessions are Howard Jones, Southern California's famous football coach, and Ward Lambert, who tutored Purdue's Big Ten basketball champions last winter.

The Carnera fight crews picked a bad spot to tip its hand—Oakland, California, just across the bay from San Francisco and in the center of an area that is "right-wise" as you may think of off-hands. This Pacific Coast territory, however, "worked" by experts, going back to the halcyon days of Jim Coffroth and Tex Kiekard. The official row around the ring has seen the best of them come and go, so that it required microscopic eye to detect the irregularities in the Carnera-Chevalier act.

Everything was all right in Oakland, it seems, until the negro Chevalier started throwing earnest punches to the Carnera jaw. This is reminiscent of the night in Paris when the late, ill-fated Battling Siki—double-crossed Georges Carpentier and beat the Orichman to a frame for the light heavyweight championship instead of carrying out the original agreement to take it on the chin.
