MAULDING IS A MEMBER OF MARINE TEAM

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 6.—One of the players on the U. S. marine rugby team which recently won the championship of the Orient, is Corporal James C. Maulding, of La Grande, Ore., according to an official list of the players received at the Marine Corps news bureau here. The team just finished an exciting season at Shanghai, winning 19, losing 1, and tying 2 games.

A rugby team was organized in China and that the sea soldiers could compete with the British and other nationals on duty in the Orient. The marines gain victories over the Wiltshire, Worcester and Welch regiments, the British warship Kent, and also defeated Shanghai, Hongkong and

other fifteens, all of which were expert in the English version of football.
