RED SOX JINXED IN SEVEN GAMES

Boston Taking Role of "Hard Luck" Team in the Major League.

The Boston Red Sox already gone a long way toward taking the role of "hard luck" team of the major leagues for the current season. The exact distance they have traveled is seven games out of the total of 15 they have played. The Red Sox, with some fine pitching and often with good playing, behind it, have lost these seven encounters by the margin of one run each. They went to Washington, two to Cleveland and one each to New York, Philadelphia and Chicago. And added to this grief there have been a few more games in which they have lost after seemingly having the victory sewed up when their opponents suddenly came to life and pounded out big rallies in the late innings.

Willie Hoppe To Give Exhibition Here Thursday

Willie Hoppe, former world champion in both 13.1 and 15.2 ballroom billiards, has been booked to appear in exhibition games at the Corner Billiard parlors on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. It was announced today.

The games here will be at both ballroom and three-cushion billiards. Hoppe, meeting the best local players after which he will display his skill at fancy shots for the entertainment of the green cloth fans. This is his first appearance in La Grande although several local players have witnessed him play in other cities.

Mr. Hoppe began playing billiards when only six years of age, using a box or bench to stand on in order to make his shots. In 1905, when only 13, he went to France and played in the Grand hotel at Paris against Maurice Vignaux, the "Old Lion" and champion of the world at 13.1 and 15.2 ballroom billiards. The match was for the title and Mr. Hoppe won 500 to 323.

Recently at Philadelphia, Mr. Hoppe defeated Otto Hobeit, one of the leading three-cushion players, 200 to 152 in 155 innings. The visiting champion holds the "world" highest run record of 29 at the angle game, also a high run of 25 made in exhibition in Denver.

Diolite Winner Of 2,000 Guineas

NEW MARKET, England, May 7 (AP)—With the King of England and Princess Mary watching from the royal box, Diolite, one of the favorites in the English derby, won the first classic of the racing season today, the 2,000 Guineas with extras over a one mile course.

As a result of his victory, Diolite is quoted as joint favorite at 100 to 8 with Carleion and Strongbow to win the derby. Diolite was held at ten to one today.

McDougal allowed 11 hits, but fanned eleven Stars. Every Hollywood player who got in the game was struck out while Catina and Leo each whiffed twice.

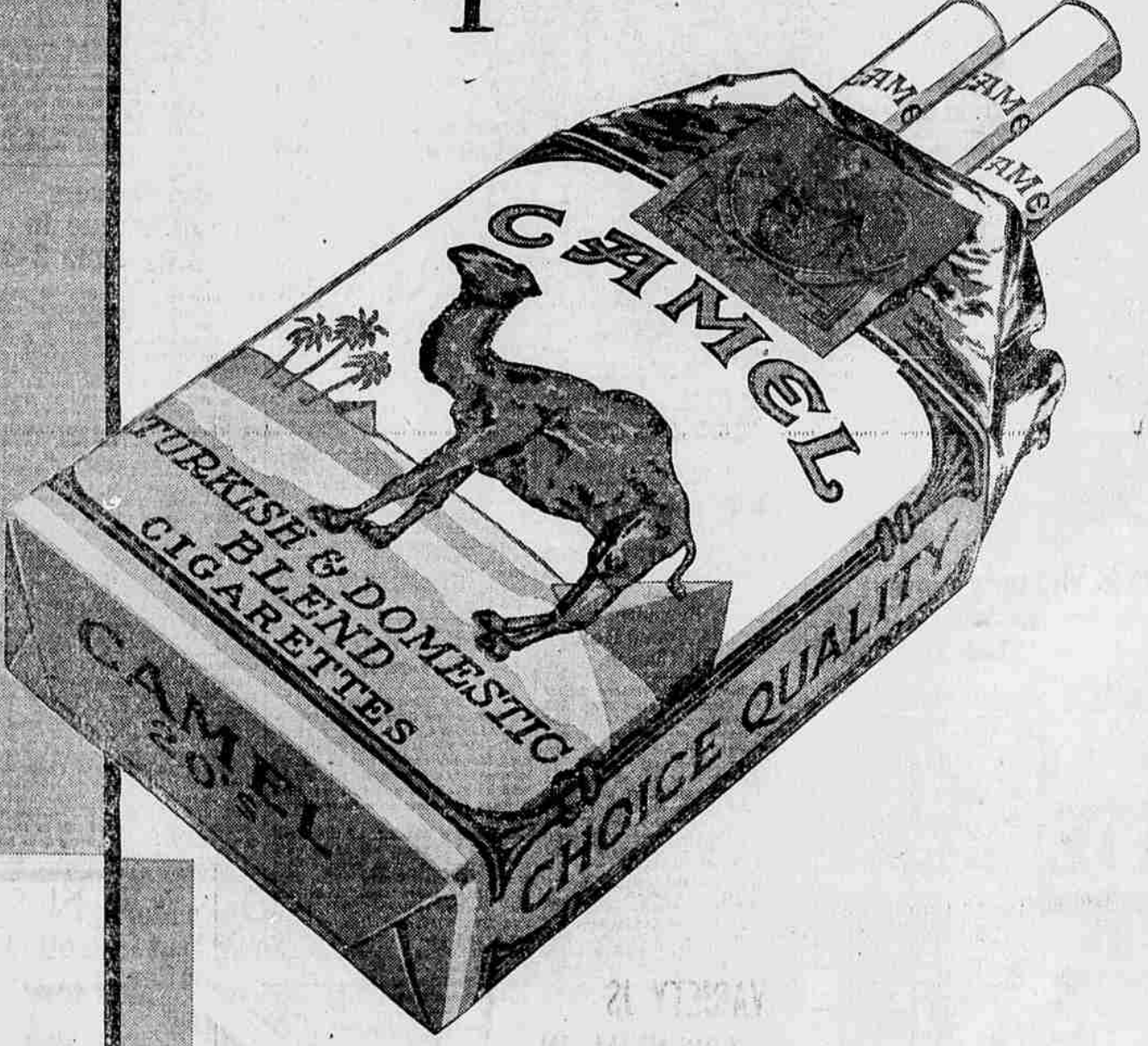
