ANTI-SALOON ASKS MORROW 'DRY OR WET?'

NEWARK, N. J., May 8 (AP) —The anti-saloon league of New Jersey has served what is in effect a notice on Dwight W. Morrow that unless he declares for prohibition in his campaign against Joseph S. Frelinghuysen for the republican senatorial nomination, a dry candidate will be named.

After a meeting of the headquarters committee of the league, attended by P. Scott McBride, national superintendent of the organization, the following statement was issued by the Rev. Dr. James K. Shields, state superintendent: "The sense of this meeting by unanimous action is as follows: The drys of New Jersey expect to have a candidate for senator for whom they can vote with good conscience. But final action on this matter is deferred until all candidates shall have been given reasonable time in which to make their statements."

Mr. Morrow has not yet announced his position on prohibition. Former Senator Frelinghuysen has declared himself a wet.

THE THINKING MACHINE
The human body is called by some scientists the thinking machine. In a narrow sense there is warrant for the name, but in the larger sense the human body is much more complicated than any man-made machine.

Consider the marvel of the brain. It is composed of more than twelve thousand million nerve cells, each of which is a living unit. These cells, grouped in certain definite classes, function in health in an integrated and harmonious fashion to produce that which distinguishes man from all other animals: intelligence.

The entire nervous system has been compared to an intricate electrical system, and nerves have been compared to nerve cells and wires. In a sense hardly appreciated the comparisons are justified.

And yet if we take our most complicated electrical system—the telephone—and compare it with the nervous system it appears like a child's toy boat against a modern ocean going steamer.

Neither the transmitting nor receiving systems thus far developed in radio can approximate either the human voice or the human ear.

Television, too, provokes our enthusiasm but the human eye is an instrument of "television" of a capacity and intricacy which it is doubtful human ingenuity will ever match. In the light sensitive portions of the human eye the so-called retina, it has been estimated there are no fewer than one hundred and thirty-seven millions of nerve endings.

But perhaps the greatest wonder is the great abuse which the human body can stand and still carry on.

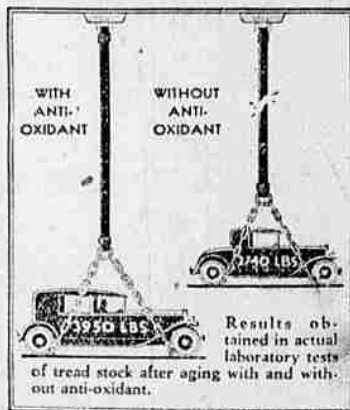
