Los Angeles' hard-hitting Angels today were more firmly entrenched in the Coast League leadership. Boosting their total of hits to 29 for ten consecutive days, the Angels defeated the San Francisco Missions 14 to 4 at San Francisco in a contest that looked like a baseball game until the third inning, then dragged along slowly to a late finish. The Angels gathered 20 hits while adding the Missions Monday and added 19 to this number yesterday. Wes Schulmerich, Los Angeles' outfielder, accounted for four of the 19 safeties in four trips to the plate.

Sacramento virtually cinched the game in the first inning with four runs, but made victory more certain by adding two in the second, one in the third, two in the fourth and three in the sixth before Oakland faltered once.
