Menus Of The Day

By Mrs. Alexander George A MAX LUNCHEON MENU Chilled White Cherries and Orange Diced Shrimp a la King Creamed Asparagus in Pastry Cases Hot Rolls Strawberry Preserves Cheese Gelatin Salad Pineapple Sherbet Pecan Cake Coffee

Chilled White Cherries and Orange Dice (Serving 8) 2 cups diced oranges. 2 cups seeded white cherries. 1-2 cup red cherries. 1 1/2 cups fruit juices (from canned cherries). 3 tablespoons lemon juice. 4 tablespoons sugar.

Boil sugar and fruit juices 2 minutes. Cool. Add other ingredients and chill. Serve in glass cups. This mixture must be thoroughly chilled in order to properly blend flavors. If there is not sufficient juice in canned cherries to make 1 1/2 cups, add water to make up difference.

Shrimp a la King. Serving 8. 6 tablespoons butter. 4 tablespoons flour. 3 cups milk. 1 teaspoon salt. 1-4 teaspoon paprika. 1-4 cup diced, cooked celery. 3 tablespoons chopped, cooked green pepper. 3 tablespoons chopped pimientos.

1-2 cup cooked shrimp. 2 egg yolks. 8 pieces hot buttered toast. Parsley. Melt butter and add flour. Blend and add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add seasonings and shrimps and cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Add egg yolks. Beat 1 minute. Serve at once poured over toast. Garnish with parsley.

Cheese Gelatin Salad 1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture. 1-2-3 cups boiling water. 1 cup white cream cheese. 1-4 teaspoon salt. 1-4 teaspoon paprika. 3 tablespoons chili sauce. 1 tablespoon catsup. Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Cool and allow to thicken a little. Beat cream with fork and add with other ingredients to gelatin mixture. Pour into loaf mold, rinsed out of cold water. Set in cold place to stiffen. Unmold, cut in slices and serve topped with mayonnaise on crisp lettuce.

Health Talks

CATARACTS

A cataract is usually due to a clouding of the crystalline lens of the eye, or of the lens covering. The crystalline lens is, as the name implies, a crystal clear body, placed in the eye just behind the pupil. To have good vision this lens must stay clear; should it become clouded, vision is impaired and blindness may result.

Nature is ingenious in the manner in which this living tissue is fed. Blood vessels could not serve this end, because were they to pass
