Discusses Dairy

At the second annual banquet of the Agricultural Club at the hotel last Friday night, Russell McKinnon of the valley was installed as president of the organization. The chief speaker was Marshall Dana, editor of the Oregon Journal. Mr. Dana outlined his remarks to the dairy situation, presenting especially the present wonderful opportunities. Among other things, Mr. Dana cited New Zealand, a country no larger than Oregon, as the greatest exporting country of the world, from which items have recently returned from a study of agricultural conditions. He stated many facts to prove that New Zealand is a fine example of cooperation and management. The second grade land there is valued at from \$200 to \$300 per acre because the industry is confined to dairying.

Because the market is varied and distant and the New Zealanders must meet all opposition, 85 per cent of the farmers belong to the Empire Dairy, a co-operative organization. As a result of this system, they rate \$4.50 per adult capita. High quality of quality have built the New Zealand milk industry. This country is menaced by a mass of under quality. Sales of dairy products have increased 2,000,000 pounds, but according to Dana, it is time to get a great deal of enthusiasm and really "cash in on Oregon."

Interesting Programs

Two programs which should have special interest for valley farmers are to be broadcast within the week from KOAC. On Wednesday night, May 21, livestock news from all over the state will be given by R. A. Lindgren, extension specialist in animal husbandry. He will cover points of interest in his own work and that of the agricultural agents. This evening at 7:15 o'clock, new ideas for promotion of canned prime sales will be suggested by Mr. M. Nelson, agricultural economist for the Oregon Experiment station. He will give a possible remedy for Oregon canned fresh prime being retained at a higher

Boulder Dam's First \$10,000,000 Just Gets Labor, Tools To Site

(Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON (AP)—The \$10,000,000 Boulder Dam appropriation President Hoover requested of Congress on arrival of signed contracts for power, will be used primarily to get workmen and their equipment into Black canyon. Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, says the first of the eight years' work scheduled for the huge concrete wedge will be to build a highway to run to the top of the cliffs overlooking the dam site. The five other main operations expected to start immediately after the appropriation include construction of railways for delivering materials, a townsite for the working force, sanitation, a water system, four diversion tunnels through which the Colorado river will flow during construction of the dam and installation of power.

ADMIRALS NOT IN AGREEMENT ABOUT TREATY

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—Two gray-haired admirals of the American navy, each with upwards of a half century of distinguished service behind him, disagreed pointedly today over the merits of the naval treaty of London. Sounding the first note of protest from any official quarter, Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, long an outstanding figure among navy men, told the senate foreign relations committee that he was not only disagreed with many of the decisions of the London conference but thought a different settlement would have been entirely possible.

At the same time, Admiral William V. Pratt, commander of the battle fleet, was advising the senate naval committee that the treaty suited him, that he was satisfied to have fewer eight-inch gun cruisers than the navy previously had asked and that in any case the American delegation at London got the best it could.

Schooner Sinks; Crew Is Rescued

NEW YORK, May 15 (AP)—The schooner Azua, bound for Bermuda with a cargo of coal, was rammed and sunk early today by the Savannah liner City of Atlanta, 47 miles southwest of Barnegat light. N. J. The Savannah line was advised today by radio.

KILLS CHILDREN, SUICIDES

TACOMA, Wash., May 15 (AP)—Using a large butcher knife, Mrs. Toraya Sadai, 30, slashed the throats of her three young

children and then took her own life by cutting her throat this morning in her home. The dead children are Noboru, 9; Ayuko, 7; and Sachiko, 5.

BAKER MAN SUICIDES

BAKER, Ore., May 15 (AP)—L. M. Vandewater, 88, Baker, ended his life last night at the home of his son by shooting himself in the head. Dependence is believed to have caused the suicide, officials said. He formerly resided at Walla Walla, Wash.

SPOKANE, May 15 (AP)—Frank Miller of Forest Grove, Ore., won the president's cup in the annual Rotary golf tournament at the Spokane club yesterday. His score was gross 82, with a handicap of 14.

IRA DERN IS EASY WINNER OVER VELCOFF

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15 (AP)—One of Ira Dern's airplane spins was sufficient for Nick Velcoff, the Russian heavy-weight wrestler, here last night, and Velcoff decided to call it a night's work. It took the Salt Lake flash just 25 minutes and 16 seconds to turn the trick. The spin followed a vicious headlock crash through the ropes and a ten-foot drop to the bare boards of the auditorium which left Velcoff an easy victim for Dern's favorite hold. As Velcoff made a furious charge at Dern, the latter doubled up to meet the rush and as the Russian hit him, Dern stretched up, taking his opponent in the air and shooting him over the top of the ropes. Velcoff landed on his back on the boards and rolled down into the orchestra pit.

Elmer Guthrie, Kansas City, and Harry Demetral, Chicago, wrestled to a draw with each taking a fall. It was mainly a tight punching contest. Farmer Vance and Harry Olson went to a draw in the curtain raiser with neither gaining a fall.

Lone Untouched Hand Told Art Expert \$400 "Fake" Hid \$150,000 Old Master

DETROIT (AP)—An expert eye which detected the stroke of a master in one untouched hand of a badly overpainted canvas, has given to the Detroit Institute of Art a \$150,000 Titian for \$400. The eye was that of Dr. Wilhelm H. Volzheim, the institute's art director.

The painting was one in the Hayemeyer collection in New York, catalogued as "School of Titian" and offered for sale at the recent auction of the collection. Other art connoisseurs and art dealers failed to detect the treasure lying beneath the heavy layer of overpaint in the "School of Titian" and passed up the opportunity to acquire an old master at a chimeric price.

Received by the Detroit institute, the painting was put in the hands of William Sahr, the institute's restorer. Careful removal of the overpaint revealed the painting as a genuine Titian, representing Doge Girolamo Prull, elected in 1535. The original was painted, according to Dr. W. H. Heil, European art curator for the institute, about 1555, during the artist's last great period.

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Apples Setting Well In Oregon, Report States

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15 (AP)—The summary of weather and crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending May 13 was issued by the United States department of Agriculture, weather bureau, yesterday and indicated that temperature was subnormal most of the week, but became higher at the close. The crop report follows: Cereals: Conditions were generally favorable for wheat; winter wheat and barley heading in the milder districts; some local damage was done to barley by frost in elevated districts. Planting corn continued, but the weather had been too cool for good germination. Fruits: Apples are setting well and pears in southern districts are doing well except for some hail injury. Drooping of prunes and cherries continues in western counties. In eastern counties prunes are in good condition. Much damage was done to pears and strawberries by frost in the upper flood river valley. Strawberries are being marketed in increasing quantities, but ripening has been delayed by cool weather. Meadows, pastures, and ranges: Pastures and ranges are furnishing abundant feed. The weather has been too cool for alfalfa and clover, and some frost damage occurred to alfalfa in elevated districts; the first cutting of alfalfa in progress in southern counties. Live stock: Stock continues to move to summer ranges, and all stock is making good gains. Shearing was somewhat delayed by unfavorable weather. Miscellaneous: Potatoes and garden fruits were somewhat injured by frost in localities. Some early planted melons failed to come up, owing to low temperature. Peas are coming into market.

After hanging for years in one of the finest collections in Venice, that of the Duchess of Berry, where it was known as a Titian, the painting was disposed of about a century ago.

The restorer, whoever he may have been, sought to add dignity to the subject, Dr. Heil believes. He did succeed in giving a patriarchal cast to the features of the aged dog, but took serious liberties with the cloak and head-dress, which in the original, were typical of the dogs of the period.

The eyes, those of an old man, were enlarged and heightened. The nose was altered. An unbroken row of buttons on the cloak was painted out and only four buttons painted on.

A thumb was added to one hand and the handle of a dagger introduced, clasped in that same hand.

The other hand, only half of which was shown in the original, was concealed entirely by changing the line of the cloak.

The layer of overpaint performed one valuable service, in the opinion of Dr. Sahr, that of protecting the original paint, which emerged from the cleaning operation in excellent condition.

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A. B. Reynolds of Portland Chosen Rotary Governor

SPOKANE, Wash., May 14 (AP)—A. B. Reynolds, Portland, Ore., was chosen yesterday as governor of the first district of Rotary International.

His nomination without opposition assures the formality of election at the Chicago Rotary convention in July, as this general session merely affirms the choice of the first district at its convention here. The first district includes Washington, Oregon, British Co-

lumbia and Alaska. Attendance prizes in various club classifications were presented to clubs from Revelstoke, B. C.; Sedra Woolley, Wash.; Uehahis, Wash.; Portland, Ore.; and Wenatchee, Wash.

Professor W. D. Smith, University of Oregon, discussing the problem of maintenance of peace, told the international rotations group that "raw material, land and food, or the lack of them, are causes of war."

"Prevention of war and the establishment of permanent peace can only be achieved by a more equal distribution of these commodities," he said.
