

VIRGINIA WILL WELCOME BYRD

"Hot Time" Waits Admiral's Arrival in His Old Home State.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—It's going to be a great day in Virginia June 17. Dick Byrd is coming home.

Winchester, the old home town, has foregone the honor of receiving him to permit Virginia to welcome her famous son at Richmond.

Here will gather thousands to acclaim Rear Admiral Richard Evelyn Byrd as scientist, explorer and conqueror of the north and south poles and the Atlantic ocean. Here also will be his wife, mother, brothers and members of his immediate family.

Virginia's admiration for his achievements will be expressed in the presentation of a sword of honor, to which more than 10,000 citizens contributed. Governor John Garland Pollard will present it in the name of the state.

John Stewart Bryan, Richmond publisher and life-long friend of Admiral Byrd, will be his Richmond host, and will give a dinner in his honor.

The dinner will bring together the Byrd brothers, "Tom, Dick and Harry." Thomas and Harry Byrd, former governor of Virginia, are leading fruit growers.

The public reception and presentation of the sword will be in Richmond's civic auditorium. Admiral Byrd will have opportunity to respond to the welcome after the presentation of the sword of honor.

The sword, designed in silver and gold, commemorates the famous flights over the north and south poles and the Atlantic crossing.

One feature is the list of his companions, engraved on the blade.

The hilt will bear the coat of arms of Virginia on one side and the arms of the Byrd family on the other. Below the Byrd crest will be Admiral Byrd's insignia as a naval officer.

An airplane, a dog sled and the ship of the Byrd Antarctic expedition are designed in precious metal along the body of the scabbard. At the heel is a chart with nautical symbols showing the route of the expedition to the south pole.

CAL DOESN'T WANT PICTURE OF HIM MOVING

BOSTON — (AP) — When the Calm Coolidge move from their Massachusetts street home in Northampton to their more pretentious "Beeches" estate, some time this month, they want no photographers lurking about.

The former president made that clear in a letter to a local representative of a news reel company. Mr. Coolidge wrote:

"I do not know if any picture could be taken while we are moving and I hope no one will come to take pictures for that purpose. After we are settled if you wish to come up, Mrs. Coolidge and I will try to help you out."

"I wish you would pass this word along to anyone that might think of coming. I am not in public life now and do not like very well to have my private affairs put on the screen. I do not know just when we shall move—some time between now and June first."

When the Coolidges leave their half of the duplex house where they now live it will be their first move, barring that to the White House, since they were married. The Beeches is a large place with spacious grounds and was purchased by Mr. Coolidge.

THIRD LIQUOR DRIVE UNDER WAY IN IDAHO

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 15 — (AP)—The federal grand jury, working on the "third drive" in Idaho's liquor cases, indicted 20 persons on various rum charges. It was made known yesterday.

The first federal drive on liquor was in the "Mullan whiskey rebellion," which resulted in two score convictions, including most of the town officials. The second was the "Wallace conspiracy" involving many officials of the mining city, which comes up for trial next month.

The third drive was made in the Lewiston district. Many arrests were made, and more secret indictments were expected. No conspiracy charges have been named yet, most charges being possession and sale.

Emerson, Nebraska In Three Counties

EMERSON, Neb., May 14 — The taking of the census has revealed to the world that Emerson is really a town divided against itself—divided three ways.

Emerson is in three counties. The schoolhouse is in one county. The postoffice in another, and the railroad station in another. There are three polling places at election time, all within a radius of 150 yards. Whenever a young Emersonian decides to marry, the person has to be very particular to ascertain what part of town the person comes from, for in marriage licenses it is the county that counts.

For a community of 1,100 persons, Emerson is very complicated.
