BIRDSHIRT POLY POLY FOR SUNDAY DINNER

Mashed Sweet Potatoes, Serving 8
Six medium-sized boiled, peeled potatoes.
Two tablespoons cream.
One-half teaspoon salt.
One-fourth teaspoon paprika.
One egg yolk.
One stiffly beaten egg white.
Two tablespoons butter.
Mash potatoes and add cream, salt, paprika, egg yolk and beaten egg white. Pile roughly in buttered baking dish. Dot with butter. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.
Birdsheart Poly Poly
Two cups flour.
Four teaspoons baking powder.
One-half teaspoon salt.
Two tablespoons sugar.
Four tablespoons fat.
One egg.
One-half cup milk.
Mix flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in fat with knife. Mix with milk, add egg and milk. When soft dough forms, roll out until 1-2 inch thick. Spread with rhubarb filling. Roll up like jelly roll. Pinch edges together to prevent filling from coming out during cooking. Place on greased pan and bake 20 minutes. Cut in slices and serve warm.
Rhubarb Filling
Two cups sliced rhubarb.
One-half cup water.
Two-thirds cup sugar.
Two tablespoons flour.
Two tablespoons butter.
One-fourth teaspoon nutmeg.
Mix rhubarb and water. Cook slowly 4 minutes. Add other ingredients and cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Cool. Spread on dough.
