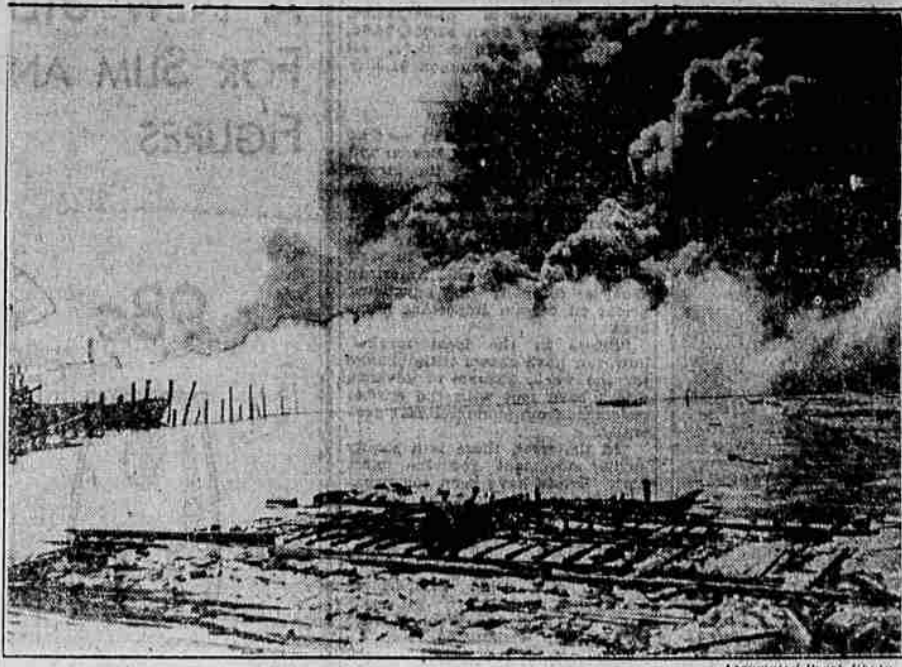

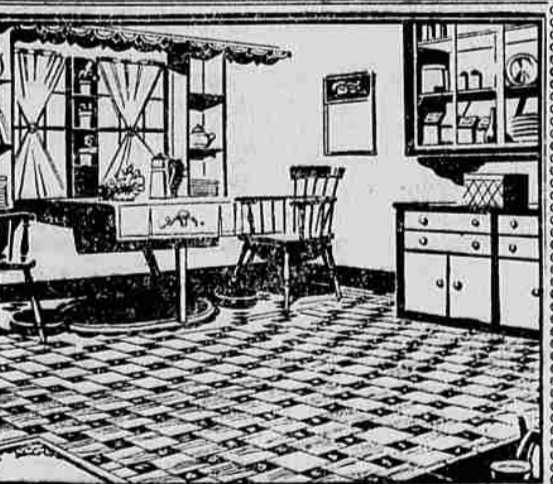

LEVEL OF FARM PRICES DECLINE

Drop Five Points in a few Weeks — Government Report is Presented

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The general level of farm prices declined sharply during the first three weeks of March and since then have made a moderate recovery, the United States department of agriculture report of April, 1929, indicated. From an average of 131 on February 15, the index of prices received by producers declined 5 points to 126 or 16 per cent below the level of last year and about as low as it was in the first part of 1927, according to the report. Regarding the various commodities the report said: Wheat: The world wheat supply situation has not changed materially in the past month but the world market situation has improved. The shortage of the Argentine crop is beginning to be felt. Supplies in the United States continue large and the carryover wheat in this country on July 1 may be about as large as on July 1, 1929. Business: Business activity for month of March appears to have been somewhat lower than for February. After allowing for normal seasonal trends, industrial production averaged about 2 per cent less in March than in February, although about 5 per cent above the low point of last December. Potatoes: The general average of farm prices of potatoes on March 15 at \$1.37 per bushel was 2 cents lower than on February 15 and compares with 58 cents on March 15 a year ago. Hogs: The decline in hog prices which started in late February continued throughout March but was checked in early April when prices stabilized and made a slight recovery. The downward curve about 3 months earlier than the usual spring decline and at a time when supplies were continuing to decrease, thus reflecting a much weaker demand situation than had prevailed earlier in the winter. Cattle: Supplies of cattle in April and May are expected to exceed those of a year ago and it is doubtful that the movement of unfinished cattle to the country will continue at the relatively high rate of now. There are indications that a part at least of the country buying this year was due to the anticipation of spring grazing requirements made possible by the abundant supplies of hay and low priced feeds. Cattle prices, after an advance during the first week of March, started to decline and reached the lowest level for the year to date the third week in March. Some recovery took place the following week but prices of all kinds for beef cattle were lower than the first week of April. Hides: Hides prices have advanced sharply but consumption even at recent low prices has only slightly exceeded that of last year and storage stocks are about 25

Eastern Clubs Show Strength In Last 2 Weeks

Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Editor) Although two rainy days at the fifth did some serious damage to the schedule of the first inter-sectional series of the 1929 American league season, the results of the past two weeks have given ample proof of a clear margin for the eastern clubs over their western rivals. Starting May 1, the American league clubs played 49 games and the east's representatives won 32 of them winding up with Washington 4 to 2 triumph over the Cleveland Indians in the only American league game which escaped rainy and cold weather. The Senators put themselves above the 500 mark for the inter-sectional play by their final victory. They won seven games and lost six.

The Philadelphia Athletics, champions and league leaders, made the best showing of the inter-sectional play. They won eleven games and lost but two, one each to Cleveland and St. Louis. The National league, with the completion of its first inter-sectional series scheduled for today, also got in only one game yesterday. That was a wild hitting thriller in which the Boston Braves edged out the Chicago Cubs by 3 to 2. Burleigh Grimes, former pitcher to the Cubs, gave away two runs at the start and the Braves did not catch up until the fifth inning when Luce Kiebbourg hit a home run with the bases full. Chicago scored three more runs in the next inning and Boston squared that account in inning later. Rogers Hornsby's home run gave the Cubs another trio and almost won the game in the eighth but Sheriff Blake, fifth of the Chicago pitchers, gave away three more runs and the game in the final innings. Grimes, yielding 12 hits, pitched all but the last in-ning.

DIANA FISHWICK WINS AT FORMBY

Glenna Collett, American Champion, Defeated 4 up and 3 to Play.

FORMBY, England, May 16 (AP) — Diana Fishwick, 19-year-old English girl today won the British women's golf championship defeating Glenna Collett, American, four up and three to play. Taking advantage of her opponent's frequent mistakes, Miss Fishwick led Miss Collett five up at the end of the first 18 holes of their 24-hole match for the British women's golf championship today. Nearly 2000 spectators looked on in amazement as the little English girl, given little or no chance against Miss Collett in advance calculations, more than held her own on the first nine and then jumped into a commanding lead on the second.

Off Her Game Miss Collett, off her game in every department, but especially around the greens, won only two holes of the first eighteen, the first and the sixth. Miss Fishwick won the second, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, sixteenth and eighteenth to be five up at lunch. Miss Collett had nine three-putts today, it seemed, than she had had in all her previous matches in the current tournament combined. She had a medal card of 86 to Miss Fishwick's 80. Although the English girl had an apparently safe lead, some experts recalled that Miss Collett had Joyce Wethered five up at exactly the same stage in the 1929 championship only to bow in the end to the English star 3 and 1.

Tulip Triplets Feature of Bed

Did you know that tulips grew in Siamese triplets? Not only that but these unusual plants are local freaks, grown in La Grande in the tulip bed of Mrs. H. L. Mohr at their home on Main avenue. In this bed of tulips which was planted about two years ago by Mrs. Mohr, are several tulips with three perfect single blooms on one stem and quite a number with two blooms on a stem. This profusion of blooms is not due to any special care or spilling (or whatever they do to making plants grow more blooms) but is just a natural growth of the bulb. Maybe it was in observance of the census, or the third decade in 1909 that the tulips grew so much, for this is the first time (as far as is known) that this bed has ever felt praiseworthy enough to produce singles, twins, and triplets all in one season.

LITTLE RISKS

By Alice Anderson Peale If little children heeded the many warnings of mothers and nurses, if they paid more than lip service to the constant "now be careful," "watch out or you'll get hurt," they would be hampered in their lives by an excessive fear of ordinary risks. Luckily children are innately curious and unquenchably active. They learn to manage themselves in spite of all that grownups do to keep them from learning how. The moment mother's back is turned the baby seizes the stairs or experiments in climbing from floor to chair and from chair to the splendid height of the table. Of course he often falls and gets hurt to the accompaniment of mother's half vexed, half compassionate "I told you so." But not 10 minutes later he tries the same trick again. Since children are eternally venturesome, it is a wise mother who, instead of trying to keep her child from every possible danger teaches him instead how to manage the little risks which teach him the bodily skill that he is bound to acquire. She lets the baby start to climb the stairs but she stands close behind him as he mounts from step to step, letting him extricate himself out of his own difficulties as far as possible, helping him only when he would otherwise actually fall and hurt himself severely. She watches him climb the furniture but stands inconspicuously close by to save him from more than a bump. The back yard swing, the small slide and other simple playground apparatus are a great help in allowing the little child to acquire dexterity and muscular control at a minimum of dangerous risk. The mother who lets her child take little risks saves him from real danger.
