NOMINATION IS CONCEDED OVER OREGON (Continued from Page One) Willard 3411. A. C. Hough trailed Ed S. Piper, Hough polling 2488 and Piper 2586.

Senator Joseph, whose announcement of his intention to enter the primaries followed that of all others, began his political career in 1919 when he was elected to the state senate from Multnomah on his anti-assembly issue. At the end of the term he did not seek re-election and it was not until 1929 that he again became a candidate and was elected, serving two terms. During the interim he practiced law.

A Stormy Petrel His career in the senate where he was somewhat of a stormy petrel was marked, not by introduction of laws, but by the opposition to measures which he contended were opposed to public interests. Joseph next came into the public eye about one year ago when the alleged feud between him and Thomas Mannix, Portland lawyer, came to a climax. The feud had its inception in differences growing out of the E. Henry Wempe estate. During the course of the quarrel, its scope was broadened and involved two justices of the state supreme court. Joseph, publicly charged that there was alleged undue association between Mannix, the two justices and others.

One Wet Candidate Only one candidate in the gubernatorial race announced himself as favoring the modification of the eighteenth amendment. He was Hugh, who ran fourth among the four principal candidates, L. B. Sandblast, republican candidate for representative in congress from the third district (Multnomah county), the other one who injected the prohibition issue into the primaries, ran second to Franklin H. Koppel, republican incumbent. In 1927, preceding Senator Charles McNary, republican incumbent, polled 57,587 and Elton Watkins, democratic candidate for United States senator 5013. For republican committeeman in the same number of precincts Ralph E. Williams polled 58,591 and Charles E. Walker 25,115.

Two hundred and sixty-seven precincts gave William G. Hawley 56,727 for the nomination as congressman from the first district. He is the republican incumbent, William A. Detsell, democratic candidate for the position, received 2813 in the same number of precincts. For supreme court justice, position number 149, J. M. Campbell, republican, was given 52,848 in 1186 precincts while George Shephard, republican, polled 38,563 and Oliver P. Costlow, democratic incumbent, received 5582.

Harry Belt, republican incumbent of the supreme court justice, position six, unopposed, had rolled up a total of 11,891 in 298 precincts. C. A. Howard, republican, unopposed for the position of superintendent of public instruction, was given 11,894 in the same number of precincts and Howard Gram, C. H. Huddleston, Boise, R. D. Nowell, Salt Lake City; I. F. Albert, Boise; Mrs. George Ifft Sr. and Nicholas Ifft Jr., Pocatello; C. C. Clementson, Seattle; E. W. Hutton, Los Angeles; W. A. Hutchins, Berkeley, Cal.; J. H. Coe, Portland; Glen Fox, Stayton; W. H. Hall, Boise; Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Spencer, Echo.

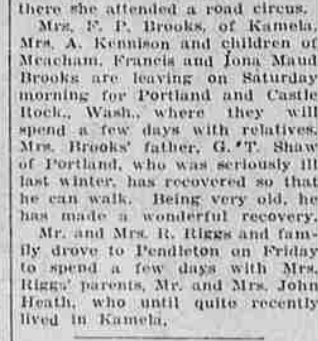
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
