SCOUTS PREPARE FOR CAMP PERIOD

Dates for Vacation at Lake Anthony Have Been Set for July 27-Aug. 24

JOSEPH AND BAILEY PORTLAND, Ore., May 19 (AP)—The Oregon electorate laid back into its preliminary routine today, but with an eye for developments expected to mark the nomination of Senator George W. Joseph, successful republican vindication candidate for governor, and Edward P. Bailey who won the democratic nomination and will be Joseph's opponent in the November general elections.

Senator Joseph, who is a committee of state lawyers recommended by legal practices for life because of his alleged attack on two justices of the state supreme court, maintained his more than 4000 vote lead over A. W. Norblad, incumbent republican governor and his closest competitor in the primary primaries.

Joseph topped 50,000 in the Eighteen hundred and eighty precinct, one of the 1982 in the state gave Joseph 50,382 and Norblad 46,159. Twenty-two precincts are yet incomplete but Joseph's lead of 4223 insured him the nomination. Prior to the returns from Clatsop county, Governor Norblad's home territory, Joseph's lead was considerably greater but Clatsop county cut down the lead by 600 votes.

Henry Corbett, another of the six Republicans who sought the gubernatorial nomination, pulled third with 33,775. Because of Corbett's showing political observers in the state and Multnomah county, drew new charts of the political situation because Corbett, from the start, was touted as the favorite. Joseph's nomination caused considerable consternation in regular republican quarters.

Bailey's Lead Narrows Bailey's lead over George Wilbur, who, with two others sought the democratic nomination, was cut 355 in 1923 precincts. Bailey polled 19,323 and Wilbur, 16,083 with A. C. Hough, who the day before publicly announced himself as opposed to the prohibition amendment, running a poor fourth, Ed. S. Upper ran third in the democratic contest with 4246.

Political observers eyed the results of the vote between Norblad and Bailey as indicative of the anti-Joseph trend. Regular republican who supported Governor Norblad, were reported on the verge of disregarding blood-bound party rules and swinging the Norblad vote to the democratic victor.

Joseph's victory was hailed by his constituents as a victory for the people because of his indicated fight by votes of his preferred position him by the committee of state lawyers. The senator's political activity started in 1919 when he was elected to the state senate from Multnomah county. In 1920 he was elected to the position again and about one year ago he leaped into the public prints by the climax of an alleged feud between him and Thomas Mannix, Portland attorney, Joseph brought disbarment proceedings against Mannix and the Portland lawyer retaliated.

Two Justices Involved During the course of the quarrel, two justices of the state supreme court were involved and Joseph charged that a "too familiar relationship" existed between the justice and Mannix. The state supreme court has not yet ruled on the recommendations of the state committee.

Charles L. McNary, incumbent republican United States senator, polled 64,798 in 1923 precincts, pulled Eflon Watkins, democrat, seeking the nomination received 11,115.

Ralph E. Williams, incumbent republican national committeeman, in 1924 precincts, retained a lead of 25,948 over Charles F. Walker, republican candidate. Walker, former Oregon governor, who with Oswald West, also a former Oregon governor, figured in a lively political fray, won the democratic nomination for national committeeman by polling 18,233 votes in 1752 precincts over West's 18,282.

Willis C. Hawley, incumbent republican congressman from the first district, won the nomination
