Wheat Doing Well, Avery Tells Club—(Continued from Page One) lamb crop this year and the best feed in many seasons. He sees no particular change in the beef cattle situation. Dairying is probably producing as much as any of the other lines and compares favorably with general farming, he said. Very few cows have been sold and there is need for large herds on individual farms, the speaker declared.

Wheat Movement Mentioned—In connection with co-operative marketing, he pointed out the organization of the wheat men and also a lamb pool, both of which are expected to be to the advantage of producers of this county. He estimated the wheat loans would amount to over \$100,000 on the 1929 crop, with the loan price around \$10.00 more than the present selling price of wheat.

Mr. Avery also stated that his office, assisted by farmers over the county, is trying out new alfalfa, new grains, weed spray and the strip border method of irrigation this year. The latter is a plan for irrigation by flooding. In commenting on the cherry situation, Mr. Avery stated that the cherry fruit fly isn't anything to worry over in this section, as spray is required. He expressed the opinion that all trees in the county would be sprayed this season and expects a better market for local cherries than those grown in Western Oregon.

GRAF TURNS NOSE TOWARD PERNAMBUCO

(Continued from Page One) soared away from her ground position and presently dumped her water ballast in a great shower. This gave impetus to her rise but drenched the crowd below. The people laughed it off as the price of seeing the historic event. No Spare Space—There was not an inch of spare space left aboard the zeppelin. A large amount of mail had to be left behind. There was neither room nor postage for it. The civil guard, crack police force, was delegated to watch for stowaways. The official report was asked if any had been found. He emphasized his negative reply.

At the Graf Zeppelin pointed her nose seaward from Cadiz today, she began a voyage into a new part of the world for dirigibles. This will be the first time that the Graf will find itself south of the equator and the first opportunity South Americans will have to see the huge ship. The south Atlantic, over which the Graf is now cruising, has been crossed nine times by airplanes. The first flight was made in 1922 by Captain Saccadura and Captain Coutino, Portuguese, from Lisbon to Rio Janeiro by way of the Canary Islands. The most recent flight was last week when Jean Mornieux, French aviator, flew from St. Louis, Senegal, to Natal, Brazil.

RETRACES ANCIENT COURSE—REYKJAVIK, Spain, May 20 (AP)—Retracing the course of the Spanish conquistadores 400 centuries ago, the Graf Zeppelin, giant German dirigible, left the airport here at 8:20 a. m. (5:20 a. m. E. S. T.) today on a 2750-mile journey to Pernambuco and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The departure was more than an hour delayed from the 7:15 a. m. starting time which had been set originally. It had been hoped to get the ship away shortly after dawn and thus eliminate taking heat by the air in the intense heat which develops here later in the day.
