pepper and celery salt. Dip in crumbs and egg yolks, mixed with water. Dip again in crumbs. Heat fat in frying pan, add meat. Brown well. Place in baking pan, dot with butter and add one-half cup hot water. Bake 1 hour.

Tomato Salad Eight slices tomatoes. One cup sliced cucumbers. One-fourth cup chopped celery. Two tablespoons chopped onions. Two tablespoons chopped green peppers.

One-half teaspoon salt. One-fourth teaspoon paprika. One-half cup stiff mayonnaise. Three tablespoons chili sauce. (Chili ingredients. Arrange tomatoe on lettuce, add cucumbers, celery, onions and green peppers. Sprinkle salt and paprika. Top with mayonnaise and chili sauce. Long's Peak Orange Cream Pie Ph. Cui

One cup flour. One-fourth teaspoon salt. One-third cup lard. Two tablespoons cold water. Mix flour and salt. Cut in lard with knife and, mixing with knife, slowly add cold water. When stiff dough forms, roll out to fit into deep pie pan. Prick sides and bottom with a fork. Bake.

Orange Cream Filling Two-thirds cup sugar. One-third cup flour. One-eighth teaspoon salt. Three tablespoons lemon juice. One cup orange juice. Two-thirds cup water. One tablespoon butter. Three egg yolks.

Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add fruit juices and water. Add butter and egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until very thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Pour into baked shell, and cover with meringue made by beating egg whites until stiff and adding 4 tablespoons of confectioner's sugar. Bake 12 minutes in slow oven.
