Gandhi's Aide Again Arrested By The British

DHARASANA, India, May 21 (AP)—For the second time since succeeding to leadership of Mahatma Gandhi's civil disobedience campaign, Mrs. Soorjini Naidu was arrested during a raid on the salt deposits here in which some of her volunteers were injured and many others arrested.

Today's raid was featured by a strategic move by the volunteers who divided into two bodies which converged from different directions upon the glistening piles of salt.

Seeing the Indians separate their forces, the police concentrated upon the nearest group. These, however, broke into a run and outdistanced the constables until they reached the sea defenses of the salt heap. They surged about these until the police rushed up and scattered them with blows from their long bamboo sticks.

The main body of about 2000 Indians made for another salt pile and the police accordingly wheeled and charged it in turn.

With wild cheers and cries of "Jai Mataram," the volunteers milled about the salt heaps trying to pass the wire which barred the projecting wire fence in order to pull them from the ground.

They were frustrated in this attempt, the police charging the yelling, struggling mass and repeatedly hitting out with their sticks. The volunteers did not fight back, carrying out the instructions previously given them by Mrs. Naidu.

Board Is Asked To Drop Married Women Teachers

The board of directors of the La Grande school district No. 1 met Monday night with all members present, when a committee from the Central Labor council and non-affiliated labor organizations consisting of H. A. Scott, William Hesse, Frank Cullen and Otto Pieper appeared before the board and requested on behalf of labor that the school board adopt the policy of eliminating in the near future from the La Grande schools all married women teachers. The school board took no action on the matter.

The various members of the committee made representations supporting the requests and stated that the labor organizations will extend its activities on the subject over Union county.

Some committee members suggested dropping every married teacher at one time and others suggested elimination each year of a considerable number, first dropping Juniors in length of service. The committee said that the board should decide the method. It is reported that the discussion was entirely informal and very pleasant.

The school board members say that only two married women teachers had been employed in five years and in both cases these teachers were first engaged as substitutes or emergency instructors and then continued in service because of superior ability. It was also brought out that the supreme court has decided that a school board has no authority to dismiss

BLANTON CARRIES TEXAS
ADLEND, Tex., May 21 (AP)—Thomas L. Blanton, aggressive Texas congressman who retired two years ago to enter the senatorship race against Earle B. Mayfield, today seemed assured of return to Washington as representative from the 17th Texas congressional district.

Opposing Mrs. B. O. Lee, candidate for the place left vacant several months ago by the death of her husband, Blanton today had a lead of 1350 out of 14,470 votes counted.

Of the votes tallied, he had received 7915 and Mrs. Lee 6555.

Blanton was defeated in the democratic primary of the senatorship race two years ago, and did not reach the runoff election in which Tom Connally defeated Mayfield.



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
