Sheep Slain In Wallowa Co. By Coyotes, Report

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special)—Sheep owners in various parts of this county report that their flocks are being molested to some extent by coyotes and other animals.

Gaslin & Cussins who have a band of some 125 head of ewes and lambs at their farm in the hills a few miles east of town, report some lambs killed by a coyote the latter part of the week. The lambs were killed while the herder was away from the flock for a short time getting dinner. Investigation of the nearby hillside led to the discovery of a den where six young coyote pups were dug out and killed. For a number of years sheep have been bothered, but little by coyotes in this community. The several years work on the part of government hunters appears to have been very effective in clearing out many of the coyotes and other predatory animals which in former years caused much loss to sheep owners. The recent instances where sheep have been killed is thought to have been the work of old coyotes, which had a litter of young in close proximity of where the sheep were ranging.

T. O. Johnson, the largest potato raiser in this end of the valley, has been busy during the past few days planting his spuds. Mr. Johnson Saturday finished planting some 10 to 12 acres on an irrigated tract a short distance east of town. as rapid during the past ten days while the weather has been somewhat cooler, however, this is considered good because of the fact that much of the fall sown wheat grew so rapidly during March and April that much of it was getting too well along for this season of the year. With the growth being slowed up to some extent by the cooler weather farmers feel that there is not likely to be any danger of the grain being injured by freezing during the latter part of this month or in June. Spring sown crops have come up evenly in all fields which had been seeded for any length of time and give promise of good crops if moisture conditions are up to normal for the latter part of the season.

Poisoning of ground squirrels is occupying the attention of farmers part of the time. The young rodents have made their appearance in large numbers during the past few weeks and with the bunch-grass in the pasture tracts becoming tough they have been moving into the grain fields by the thousands. A great deal of poisoning has been done at many of the farms and fine success in getting large numbers of the young is reported by many people.

MALHEUR CO. EXPERIMENTS ON RANGE LAW

ONTARIO, Ore., May 20 (AP)—Malheur county voters determined at the May primary election to experiment with a law governing the grazing of livestock on the ranges of the state. This law was adopted in 1923 but has never been operative, because it could not be invoked in any county until it had been passed upon by the voters of the county.

The proposition was submitted on a petition inaugurated by

stockmen of Jordan Valley who declare they have suffered for years from the practice of Idaho and Nevada stockmen driving their herds through the south end of the county, denuding ranges in the early spring.

The voters by a count of 1733 to 371 determined to try the law which permits the regulation of the range by a county grazing board. Malheur is the first county to approve the measure.

Voters of Malheur county have returned C. H. Oxman to the state legislature by a vote of 943 to 764.

David E. Graham won the nomination for county judge from Geo. W. McKnight by a vote of 847 to 750.

WHALEN RESIGNS

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—Grover A. Whalen has resigned as police commissioner of New York. He will retire from the office at noon today.

Mrs. Whalen told reporters he was returning to the John Wamsley department store in an executive capacity. He left a \$100,000 a year job as general manager of the store to accept the \$16,000 a year commissionership.
