Baccalaureate Services To Be Sunday Evening

Most of Churches Will not Hold Evening Meetings Because of High School Program.

Baccalaureate services for the La Grande High school graduating class of seniors stand out as probably the most important of Sunday's program in La Grande, and some of the churches are foregoing their usual Sunday evening services so that the congregation may attend.

The church programs for Sunday follow:

English Lutheran Church

At the morning worship, beginning at 11 o'clock, the pastor will bring the sermon on the subject "Power," continuing the consideration of the general subject, "Perpetuating Pentecost." Mrs. J. A. Wonderlick will render a violin solo, "Adoration," by Borwick, accompanied by Mrs. N. Combs. The choir will sing the anthem, "How Firm a Foundation," by Lowden.

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special).—Very wet and chilly weather has prevailed over this section of the country during the greater part of the week. Light flurries of snow were in evidence during part of the day Wednesday and a light blanket of "white" could be observed on the mountains and in the higher parts of the timbered areas north and east of town. Grass and grain crops have not made a very rapid growth during the past two weeks because of the cold backward weather. Farmers feel that this condition is highly favorable to the winter wheat crops, as much of the early sown grain had made such a rapid growth during the past few weeks that many spots were going down and much of it beginning to joint. Spring sown grain in most instances has come up quite even and gives promise of a good stand. Planting of potatoes has been going on at some of the farms during the past few days. But little of the late garden truck has been planted yet, most people preferring to wait until the weather becomes warmer.

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Lyman, Anson, of La Grande, Earn Points In Meet

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 22.—Richard Lyman and Claude Anson, two former La Grande high school athletes, were brilliant performers in a dual track meet here last Saturday in which Oregon State college defeated the University of Idaho 102 to 29.

Lyman, along with Kretzmer, another Oregon State man, tied for first place in the pale vault event. Both men vaulted 12 feet. Lyman also tied for first place in the high jump with Carter of Oregon State. Their height was 5 feet 11 inches.

Anson tied for first place in the 800-yard run with Milton and Cantine, of Oregon State.

Anson and Lyman will be seen in action in the meet with Oregon University here next Saturday, and also in the Pacific Coast conference meet at Pullman, Wash., May 29-31.

Dr. Karl Sarpolis Wins in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22 (AP).—Dr. Karl Sarpolis, Cleveland medic-wrestler, defeated George Kontonaras, Hollywood, Cal., here last night two out of three falls. Sarpolis surprised the Californian when he applied his famous flying scissors hold to take the first fall in 22 seconds as the referee stepped back after giving his instructions. Kontonaras came back to win the second fall in 25 minutes, 20 seconds with flying maces after wearing the doctor down with almost every hold known to the game, including Southern flying tackle. Kontonaras resumed his flying mace attack in the final session, but grew careless and left himself wide open for a body slam, to which he succumbed after three slams. The time was 1:40 minutes.

DISLIKE DIAL PHONES

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP).—The senate today directed its sergeant at arms to clear the senate wing of the capitol of dial telephones.

It adopted a resolution of Senator Glas, democrat, Virginia, who complained yesterday that the new telephones were "a nuisance."

The senate office building also will be cleared of the automatic phones, which only recently were put into effect in Washington.

Large Cherries In The Dalles Area

THE DALLES, Ore., May 22.—(AP)—Although cool weather is slowing maturity of cherries here, the fruit is showing steady growth and will be better than average in size, growers declare. The harvest will be well under way about the middle of June, with the crop estimated at 2,500 tons, which would be a record output of cherries this year.

C. R. Williams, Portland, who has completed an inspection of orchards on the Canadian border to the mid-Columbia, said that cherry growers of The Dalles have the best crop prospects he has seen. Lower Yakima valley orchards, Williams said suffered from late frosts.

RUBBER TREE DISCOVERED THAT MAY GROW IN U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Experiments to grow rubber trees in the United States for economic use may find success in plants native to Southern Madagascar.

About 25 young trees brought from that island more than a year ago are now flourishing under the scientific eye of the bureau of plant industry of the department of agriculture.

Transplanted at Bard, Cal., and near San Diego, as well as near Miami, Fla., all the plants survived under natural climatic conditions.

In Madagascar where the trees have become practically extinct through commercial exploitation, they reach a maximum height of 24 feet with a maximum stem diameter of nearly nine inches, although generally these dimensions are less.

"The international commerce of the world is passing through a period which finds no close parallel in recent years. The present rate of activity is shown to be considerably slower than that of only a few months ago. The rate of the first eight or nine months of 1929 proceeded at an unusual pace, so that despite the slackening that occurred toward the close of the year the aggregate for the full 12 months constituted a new record both for the United States and for the world.

"There is genuine encouragement in this fact for it is notable that the gain was achieved in precisely that element of our export trade that is directly responsible to merchandising enterprise and skill."
