WOMEN'S TACK HELPS KEEP FRENCH WORKERS CONTENT

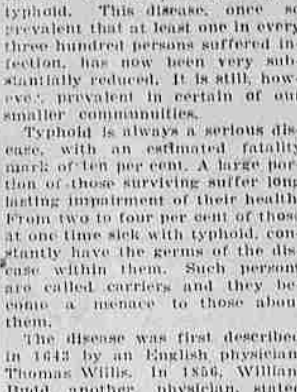
PARIS (AP)—France is saving money and contributing to the happiness and prosperity of her working people by placing women supervisors in factories.
