By the time he is well he has become a full fledged tyrant and it will take several weeks of wise handling before he is himself again. There are plenty of amusing things for a child to do when he has reached the sitting up stage of convalescence. Any kind of quiet hand work is good.

Knitting reels on a spool, cutting out pictures and pasting them into a scrap book, sewing, making paper dolls and designs of colored paper, using building toys, making patterns with mosaic blocks, putting together puzzles, playing with clay, all these and many more are good occupations which the child will enjoy and which will prevent him from thinking about himself and making demands upon the people who surround him.

It is a good plan also during this time when a child is likely to become self centered, to suggest that he make things for other children who are sicker than he and who are away from home in hospitals with no mother to look after them.
