TRACK

SIMPSON DEFEATS TOLAN DYCHE STADIUM, Evanston, Ill., May 24 (AP)—George Simpson, Ohio State flier, defeated Eddie Tolan, holder of the world's record of 9.5 for the 100-yard dash, in the century opening the finals of the western conference outdoor track and field championship today by a yard and a half in 9.7 seconds.

Neither Simpson nor Tolan used the controversial starting blocks. Simpson sprang away from the mark like a shot, and won every step of the distance. Orval Martin of Purdue, premier mile distance runner of the big fog, failed in his effort to crack the 13 year old record for the mile run. He won the event, finishing six yards ahead of Makeover of Illinois in 4:22.2.

Simpson came back to win the 220 yard dash from Tolan by three yards in 21 seconds. Sammy Hehr, of Wisconsin, smashed his own big ten record for the shot put with a toss of 43 foot 1 1/2 inches, bettering his mark of 43 feet 3 inches, last year. Lee Sennaman, Illinois crack hurdler, displaced Dick Rockaway of Ohio State as high hurdle champion, winning the event in 14.3, three tenths of a second slower than the conference record. Rockaway was third.

MEIER RUNS IN 9.1

LINCOLN, Neb., May 24 (AP)—Hubert Meier, of Iowa State, was clocked at 9.4 seconds by three timekeepers and 9.2 by the fourth for the 100-yard dash today in the big six meet here today. He had starting blocks, but otherwise bettered the world's record of Eddie Tolan, Michigan star at 9.5 seconds.

HARVARD THIMS YALE

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 24 (AP)—The Harvard track team displayed its expected power in the running events and defeated Yale 74 1/2 to 60 1/2 here today in the 37th dual meet staged by these rivals since 1891. The crimson athletes won first places in eight of the 15 competitions and also scored a tie for top honors in the pole vault.
