Butter Prices Reduced a Cent in Oregon Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24 (AP)—Butter and butterfat prices were reduced today at the Portland produce exchange. This brings extra in butter to 31c and butterfat delivered Portland at 22c.

Butter prices were barely steady. With new crop cascara bark coming in, the price tendency was a trifle lower.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says: "Yakima apples continue to arrive by motortruck at the rate of 500-600 boxes daily, and are moving to retailers promptly. Wine grapes dominate the apple market now, with small C grade stock finding particularly ready outlet. Prices to retailers range from about \$1.75 for cheaper grades to \$2.25 for extra fancy.

"Strawberries were rather scarce, demand is improving, and quality is improving. Local berries are now of the quality.

"Lettuce weakened to \$1.25 per crate of 8 dozen heads, with considerably heavier supplies.

"Tomatoes show wide range in quality, ranging from truck sales at \$2.00 per lug of ordinary quality to \$2.50 per lug of extra quality.

"The large white round potatoes from Shafter, Cal., are meeting with good demand, and first arrivals are moving readily to retailers at 5c per lb. Colima germs are a share lower, at \$1.00 to \$1.25 per cwt. Old potatoes are quiet, although withdrawals from storage continue at a moderate rate."

Four tablespoons lemon juice.
Three tablespoons vinegar.
Chill all ingredients and ingredients. Beat egg yolks and add dry ingredients. Slowly add 2 tablespoons of oil, beating steadily. Alternate remaining oil and lemon juice and vinegar. Beat steadily. When dressing thickens beat 2 minutes and store in cold place. Use deep bottomed bowl and rotary egg beater.

Strawberry Torte
Three egg yolks.
Two-thirds cup sifted confectioner's sugar.
One teaspoon vanilla.
One-fourth teaspoon salt.
Four tablespoons rolled cracker crumbs.
Two-thirds cup sifted almonds.
One-half cup cocoanut.
Three egg whites, stiffly beaten.
One teaspoon baking powder.
Beat egg yolks and add sugar and beat 2 minutes. Add other ingredients, mixing lightly. Pour into shallow pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in slow oven. Cut in squares. Place squares in tall glass cups and add portions of strawberry ice cream. Cover with more squares of the torte and garnish with whole berries. Serve at once.
